Geodetic Survey Finds Spot Struck by Steamer Pennsylvania.

CAPTAINS WARNED AS TO SEAL ISLAND REEF

Government Chartmakers Explore Bay of Isles and Report New Dangers of Navigation in the Northern Waters.

Officers of the coast and geodetic survey have located two shoals off the coast of Alaska, one about two miles eastward of the Bay of Isles, and the other just northward of Seal Island, which was struck by the steamer Pennsylvania on July 24, 1908.

A rock north of Seal Island, Prince William sound, has been located and examined. The depth of the shoal of the lower waters was obtained over the rock, which is located about seven-eighths of a mile eastward of Seal Island on the following bearings: Seal Island, western side, south 23 degrees 20 minutes west, 1.5 miles; Seal Island, southern side, south 55 degrees, 30 minutes east, 1.4 miles. The approximate position fixes its latitude at 59 degrees, 25 minutes and 32 seconds north, and its longitude at 157 degrees, 24 minutes and 39 seconds west.

Four minutes was found extending from the 12-foot mark to the nine and one-half fathom spot shown on the charts northward of Seal Island and also between the rock and Seal Island. Vessels have been cautioned to exercise great care when navigating the waters in this vicinity and give Seal Island berth at least one and one-half miles when passing northward and eastward of it.

TRY TO FLOAT GALENA

It has been reported that the Willamette and Columbia River Shipping company has made an offer for the wreck of the British bark Galena, as she stands on the sands about two miles north of Gearhart Park at Clatsop beach, November 13, 1908, and has stood upright in the sands for two years, but is entirely dismantled at present.
