There is no let-up in the series of petty burglaries that have been plaguing the householders of the city awake nights and that have been baffling the police. Monday, however, was a light day in this line only one occurrence of the kind mentioned being reported to the police. A man named Nicholson, who lives at 225 Mill street, reports that he came home about 12:30 o'clock this morning, and found a man in his bedroom. Nicholson didn't try to capture the man, but ran out and tried to arouse the landlady. While he was gone the fellow escaped.

H. E. Marshall, the man arrested last Sunday on the charge of selling liquor on the forbidden day, was discharged, this morning by Police Judge Van Zante, there being no evidence against him to convict. Marshall was suspected not only of selling liquor on Sunday but of running a blind pig. Several witnesses were put on the stand this morning, but they all stuck to the same tale, that they had caught together and purchased three dozen bottles of beer, which they were drinking together in Marshall's place.

The excavation for the foundation of the new Christian Science church, on the north side of Everett street between Eighth and Nineteenth streets, was the scene of a serious accident at 6 o'clock last night. Herman Lind, a Norwegian laborer, was badly injured by the cave-in of a large section of dirt, and being caught and pinned under the fall. Several of his ribs were found to be broken when he was dug out and he sustained other injuries. He was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital. His injuries are said not to be fatal.

Charles Conrad, a saloon-keeper, charged with having allowed a minor in his saloon, was discharged by Judge Van Zante this morning. The testimony showed that Conrad was not in the saloon at the time the offense was committed, the place being in charge of a bartender, and that as soon as he learned of what had happened Conrad had discharged the man. Under the law the proprietor of a place is not liable for what takes place in his absence.
