

DAVIS FILES NEW LABEL COMPLAINT

Original Declared Defective, He Makes Charges Against Journal More Definite.

Dr. L. M. Davis, representative from Multnomah county, who subscribed to Statement No. 1, and who, after he had been elected was quoted in a newspaper interview as being uncertain whether he would observe his pledge to vote for the people's choice for United States senator, now makes the startling disclosure that he was threatened with lynching, tar and feathers and bricks, following the criticism of his alleged vacillation in the editorial columns of The Journal.

These dire threats, which he says were made by "various and sundry persons" over the telephone, are told about in an amended complaint against The Journal, filed in the circuit court yesterday afternoon.

Files Amended Complaint.
The original complaint filed by Davis, in which he asked for \$40,000 damages on the ground that The Journal had reduced him to a nervous wreck, was declared defective by the court, and he was required to make his allegations more definite and certain. His amended complaint filed yesterday is an effort to comply with this requirement of the court. He now puts his nervous damage at \$20,000, injury to his social standing at \$10,000, and further damages that he should have \$10,000 for the ruin of his opportunities to hold other political offices in the state of Oregon.

After reciting The Journal editorial on which his complaint is based, and repeating the allegations of the original complaint, his recital winds up as follows:
Says Sleep Deprived Him.
"That said matter and said imputations were, and are wholly false, untrue and defamatory, and were well known by the defendants so to be, and by reason thereof the plaintiff has been caused great bodily and mental suffering and extreme nervousness, so that he could not rest or ease any day or night, without the use of opiates and sedatives, chloral hydrate and other remedies for nervousness, and while in this condition the plaintiff was constantly annoyed by various and sundry persons calling him up by telephone, and he was threatened of being lynched, tarred and feathered and attacked by bricks, so that he was compelled to be constantly on his guard for fear of bodily injury, and he was thereby injured and damaged in his health and physical condition and mental suffering in the sum of \$20,000."

Damage to Social Standing.
"That on account of the publication of the said false and defamatory article the plaintiff's reputation and his social standing have been brought into question and discussed not only by various and sundry people in the city of Portland, but by other newspapers in other states, and he has been thereby damaged in his reputation and social standing in the sum of \$10,000."
"That by reason of said false and defamatory publication and on account of the circulation of said slanderous statements among the people of the state of Oregon, the plaintiff's opportunities for election to any other political office have been destroyed, and he has been thereby damaged in the sum of \$10,000."

13-YEAR-OLD MISS OF FOREST GROVE WINS FAIR PRIZES

MANIAC SCARES TWENTY CO-EDS

Intrudes Upon Picnickers, Pelts Them and Sets Woods on Fire.

Stanford University, Cal., Oct. 6.—County officers are looking for a supposed maniac who attacked a party of picnicking co-eds in the hills back of the university Friday. Twenty pretty girls, members of the Mantolista club, among whom were the daughters of Governor Gillett, became the target for clouds, earth and sticks. Owing to the prominence of the young women every effort was made to prevent the attack from becoming known. The girls were gathered at San Francisquito creek when the intruder sprang at them, brandishing a large stick. They ran and he began throwing clouds and stones. As they huddled in a frightened group he set the brush on fire, but the girls extinguished the flames with earth.

In the meantime two of the girls, by hiding in the undergrowth, succeeded in escaping. They reached the house of President Jordan but no one was there. Frantic with fear for the safety of their companions they telephoned to the power-house for help, directing the rescuers to Robie bridge, the scene of the attack. By mistake the rescuers went to Robie hill, but the girls had escaped their assailant in the darkness.

WIFE REFUSES BOOZE MONEY

William Peters Shoots Her Four Times, Then Kills Himself.

San Francisco, Oct. 6.—In view of a hundred persons, many of them women, William Peters, a tailor, shot his wife four times and then killed himself on the public street here today.
When Mrs. Peters regained consciousness at the hospital she said that when her husband seized her arm she asked for a dollar. She said she knew he wanted it to buy liquor, and refused, whereupon he began shooting. She said she left him because he spent all his money and hers for drink.
While the bullets were flying, scores of frightened women fled to shelter, shrieking hysterically. As Peters turned the smoking weapon on himself and fell, several of the women who witnessed the shooting fainted.
Peters met his wife at Eddy and Webster streets in company with Mrs. Nellie Ludolph, a friend with whom she had been living since her separation from her husband a month ago. Mrs. Ludolph saw Peters as he approached his victim. Frightened by the expression on Peters' face, she fled.
Peters held his wife with one hand and in the other he drew a revolver from his pocket. The terrified woman broke from his hold and as she ran Peters opened fire. At the first shot she fell but the infuriated man continued to fire at her. Then without hesitation he placed the revolver to his temple and toppled to the sidewalk, dead.
Mrs. Peters was taken to the Central Emergency hospital, where she lies in a critical condition. Peters' body was removed to the morgue.

REBATE CASES ALL UNCLE SAM'S

Los Angeles, Oct. 6.—Judge Wellborn of the United States district court has established a precedent by orally deciding that the federal courts have jurisdiction in rebate cases where the offense charged has been committed within the borders of one state. Judge Wellborn ruled that the alleged repayment by the Southern Pacific to the Penn Fruit company of money expended by the latter in hauling fruit to the freighthouses was a matter within the provisions of the interstate commerce act.
The indictment charged the Penn Fruit company of Riverside with accepting a rebate from the Southern Pacific for hauling oranges from Arlington to Riverside.
