ED WALSH HANGS SIGN ON TIGERS

Chicago White Sox Win Second Game From Detroit With Ridiculous Ease.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Oct. 6.—Pitcher Ed Walsh had the Detroit leaders of the American league swinging their heads off yesterday and Chicago easily won the second game of the final series, 6 to 1. By winning from Detroit in the game this afternoon, since Cleveland was eliminated by dropping the first game of a double header to St. Louis yesterday, the White Sox will carry the pennant for the year. Three points separate the two teams, with the Tigers in the lead.

WILLAMETTE TO INVADe ALLEY MEE WINGED "M"

Big Black-Tails Found in Next Saturday's Game Will Show Class of Two Football Elevens.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Oct. 6.—The jackrabbit, which in some years has been the greatest pest of the inland empire, is invading the Willamette valley, according to returning pheasant hunters. Oswald West, railroad commissioner, and Webster Holmes of this city returned from a hunting expedition yesterday and among other game they killed a monster black-tailed jackrabbit such as was hitherto supposed to exist only in the eastern part of the state. Other hunters around Salem report seeing them and occasionally killing one. For while it was thought these large, swift-footed rabbits were Belgian hares, it will be remembered that not many years ago there developed a market for breeding Belgian hares. There was no market for the animals, however, the fad ceased and many people rather than kill their own hares, turned them loose in the woods and fields. Hunters say that the specimens being taken in the valley are the same as Oregon "jacks," the chief despair of the inland empire graingrowers and stock-raiser.

All persons hunting must be required to carry a written permit from the owner of the land they hunt upon other than their own. And they would put upon guns and dogs except those kept by residents upon farms for their protection.
