GIANTS HITTING WINS PENNANT

Donovan Holds Chicago to Two Hits and Not a Solitary Run.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Oct. 7.—"Wild Bill" Donovan, the greatest pitcher on the Tiger staff, was called upon yesterday to stop Chicago's winning streak and save the pennant for the crippled, heart-worn champion. Donovan pitched as he never pitched before and shut the White Sox out with two meagre hits. In addition he struck out 10 men. Behnke hit the team's last hit like floods. Ty Cobb tore three safe singles off White, Walsh and Smith, the men Manager Fielder Jones sent to the mound in a vain effort to stop the slaughter. One of them was a three-bagger. McIntyre, Bush and Schaefer followed the wilder, which getting two safe hits. But Crawford was the premier hitter of the day. The great center fielder hit the ball four times safely, including a two-bagger. Added to their terrific batting was the perfect fielding of the champions. Detroit made four runs in the first inning, when McIntyre, Bush, Crawford, Cobb and Roseman knocked White out of the box. Walsh lasted till the fourth inning. With this lead Donovan went into the game reassured. The Sox could never touch him. It was a well earned victory and by winning Chicago goes to third place, while Cleveland comes up to second through defeating St. Louis yesterday, 5 to 1. The score:

NORTHERNERS TO ASK FOR CHANGE

Whitman, Washington State and Idaho Want Old Athletes Again.

Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 7.—It was learned upon good authority here today that Washington State college and the University of Idaho will join with Whitman in request for a session of the conference of northwest colleges to be held in this city in about two weeks. Idaho and W. S. C. are hit by the four-year rule and want the time of the disqualified athletes extended another year, so as to lighten the retroactive effect of the rule, which they think unjust.

Idaho will lose, by this rule, Edmondson, W. S. C. will lose Rader, Whitman loses Philbrook, Lyman and Spagle. These colleges think that Washington will be glad to join the movement on account of Reser, who would be eligible in the event the rule was extended. Oregon loses Huston and Arnsperger and would, it is thought, favor the rule. O. A. C.'s loss is not known here, but probably that school would be induced to come in if all the others did.

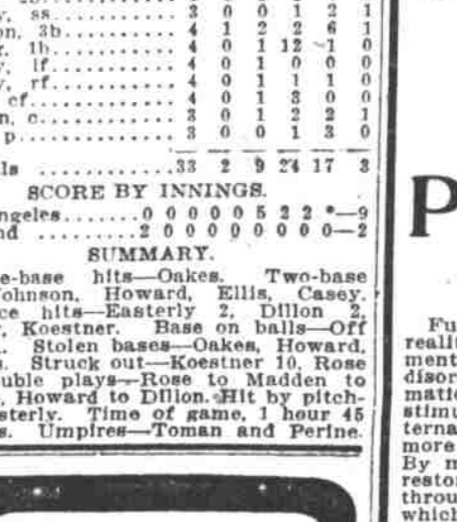
