DREDGE OREGON RAINED BY TIDE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Marshall, Or., Oct. 7.—The government dredge Oregon, which was brought here recently to dredge Coos bay, was run on the mud flats yesterday in order to make repairs of damages caused by a recent accident. The dredge ran onto a piling covered in high water and a hole was punched in the bottom. It was first thought that extensive damage had been done to the machinery, but investigation proves that the dredge can be floated in a day or two, or as soon as the hole is patched.

Captain Polhemus, of the army engineering headquarters at Portland, is here superintending the repairs. The dredge was placed in the hands of H. A. Starkey to operate and was in his charge when the accident happened. The location of any blame for the accident will be determined by the army officials. Captain Polhemus is making a thorough investigation.
