Canadian Bruin's Second Offense Meets With Fatal Results.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 8.—Last Thursday afternoon Olivia Chester of Silverdale, whose father's farm is not far from the center of the village, took an extra reef in her gingham dress and started out to milk. She had the pail nearly filled when along came a bear. So suddenly did the bear appear that Miss Chester was startled, and dropped the can of milk. This was the opportunity the bear had been waiting for. Miss Chester tried to shove bruin away, but the bear refused to move until he had drunk the milk.
When Miss Chester left the milkhouse the next evening she carried the pail in one hand and a rifle in the other.
The bear did not appear until the pail was full and then he came in a hurry. Miss Olivia went through the same motions as on the previous evening and momentarily deserted the milkpail. The bear buried his head in the pail like a pig but at that moment Miss Chester shot him.

W. E. Conyers Uses Revolver to Bring Down Dog-Eating Cat.
