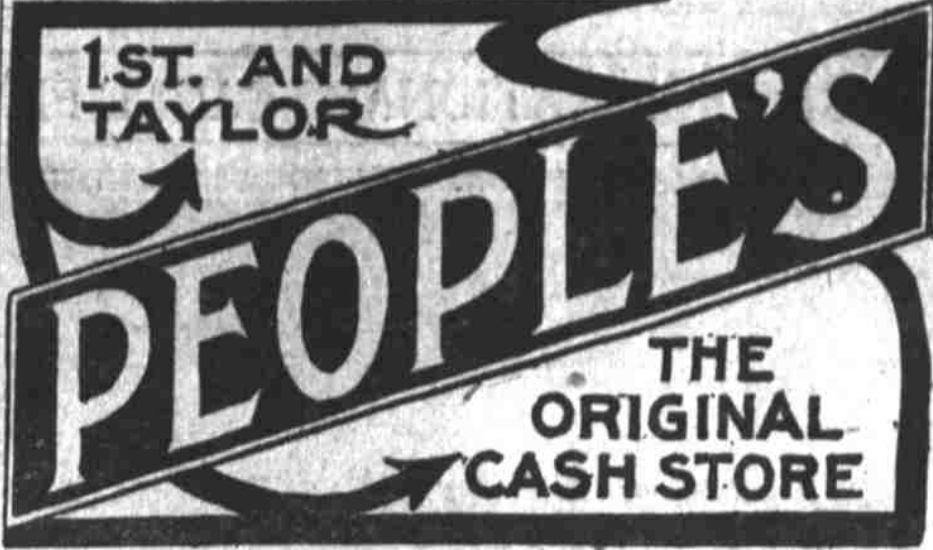

SHORTS VOICES RAILWAYS' PLEA

Says Rule by State Commission Means Ruin—Mr. Bryan's View.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—"The public utilities commission law in New York has killed railroad development, and government ownership of railroads would be better than the state of affairs in New York being made permanent," declared Theodore P. Shonts, former head of the Panama canal commission and now president of the Interborough Metropolitan Traction company of New York city. In his address, which was delivered before the Lakeland-gauged deep waterways convention, he said in part: "The despoiling of the waterways between the great lakes and the gulf of Mexico is a matter of national even international importance. It is not opposed to the development of the railroads of the country. The greatest obstacle now confronting the railroads is the provision of adequate terminals. The opening of this waterway will form 1,000 miles of ocean harbor, every point of which will be accessible for railroads. The railroads are the backbone of transportation. It is impossible to strike a blow at the railroads without hitting the main artery of the country. The danger the country faces today is the physical operation of railroads by commissions. "We now have public service commissions in New York which supervise and control the railroads, with the result that the railroad development in New York is dead. The menace is in the law itself. Rather than see this commission government ownership of railroads. "The solution of the problem of maintaining railroads development rests in giving the railroads a square deal." J. A. O'Connell of St. Louis in an address before the convention today described his tour of investigation of European waterways. He declared that all doubt of the feasibility of improving the Mississippi to any extent to meet the demands of commerce had been removed. He referred to the natural advantages of waterways in the United States over Europe, where many difficulties are confronted. Mr. Bryan on Water Rates. Mr. Bryan in his address to the convention yesterday expressed the following view of the rate situation: "Where there is a river or a natural transportation. God made the rivers; man made the railroads. The rivers were invented and while the railroad has given us speed, it has not given us the cheapness that the river gives. And speed is not the only thing. The railroad cannot rival the watercourse in cheapness, and then there is another advantage that the watercourse has. When you finish a river sufficiently deep for commerce, or a canal upon which boats can float, you make it possible for a man with a small capital to act, while the railroads made it possible for men with large capital to act. Where there is a river or a man who can build a boat can engage in transportation and, if he cannot build a big boat, he can build a little boat, and if you have a large number of little boats, the big boat will have to meet the rate that the little boat fixes. You will find it much easier to regulate rates on water than on land because competition can be much more active on water than on land." Before adjournment the congress passed a resolution declaring that the organization would not support a political candidate who did not favor the objects sought by the Lakes to the Gulf Deep Waterway association. The delegates then decided that the next meeting place would be Orleans during the period from November 10 to 15, 1908. The convention adjourned sine die at 1 o'clock this afternoon. The nominating committee today reported a recommendation that the present officers of the organization, with few minor changes, be re-elected. The report was unanimously adopted. The officers of the organization at present are: President, W. K. Kavanaugh, Missouri; first vice-president, E. C. Conway, Illinois; secretary, W. Saunders, Missouri; treasurer, George H. Munro, Illinois. Government scientists who have been measuring them say rain drops vary in size from the merest speck of water to two inches in diameter.
