

WILLIAMETTE VALLEY PEOPLE Tired of Unfulfilled Promises, and Democrat's Majority in Oregon Seems Assured, Declares Miller.

The sun is shining brightly on the Bryan campaign in the up-valley counties according to National Committeeman M. A. Miller, who has just returned from a trip through Linn, Benton, Polk, Yamhill and Washington counties.

During the past few days Mr. Miller has been making a tour of the valley and has found that the prospects for Bryan's success are growing brighter day by day. In all of the counties the central organizations are taking an active interest in the campaign and are planning rallies, and holding meetings, distributing literature and making personal canvasses of the situation. From this activity bright reports are coming.

"I found the condition of things even better than I had anticipated," said Mr. Miller this morning. "The Bryan sentiment is growing daily and if the election were to be held today Bryan would get much more than his party vote in every precinct. The farmers are waking up to the issues of the campaign and are turning to the support of the principles outlined in Mr. Bryan's platform. They believe that he has the right stand and are preparing to support him at the polls."

"Everywhere a meeting has been held and it has been a success. An enthusiastic one and altogether I believe that the prospect of Mr. Bryan's success in the state is now brighter than it ever was. I believe that Bryan will carry the state. That is a big prophecy in the face of the vote of 1904 but conditions are different now and the people are clamoring for change. They have grown hopeless of promises being fulfilled and are turning to Bryan for relief."

Before the committee took final action Councilman Anand questioned Mr. Dobson about his knowledge of building and asked him if he did not think a nine-inch wall thick enough. Mr. Dobson replied that he did not. Anand then remarked emphatically that in his opinion such thickness was insufficient and that he knew as much about it as the building inspector, anyway.

Williams' Ordinance. Following is the ordinance recommended for passage by the committee:

"Section 1.—The thickness of walls of all buildings and five stories in height other than wood frame buildings, erected outside the fire limits of the city of Portland and erected for use or occupation as apartment houses, dwelling houses, lodging houses or tenement houses, shall be as follows:

"Section 2.—Walls built in between iron, steel or reinforced concrete columns or masonry piers; or carried on iron, steel or reinforced concrete girders, supported by iron, steel or reinforced concrete columns, may be built not less than eight inches thick.

The British press today openly hints that the breaking up of the present alignment in the Balkans will be the cue for England to annex Egypt. This daring suggestion has caused wide comment and, though it is impossible to induce anyone at the foreign office to discuss it, there is a general belief here that it is among the possibilities of the situation.

Belgrade, Serbia, Oct. 8.—Preparations have been completed for the removal of the seat of government from this city to Nish, a fortified town 130 miles southeast of here. It is the second largest city in the country. King Peter is still holding out against war with Austria, but the people continue to clamor for immediate opening of hostilities and there is little doubt they will enforce their demand. The removal of the government offices to Nish is considered the most significant action that could be taken. It will be possible to hold Nish against an invading army if the development of affairs should make such action necessary.

RESTRICT BARN MORE CAREFULLY

Proposed Ordinance Will Enforce Better Conditions in Livery Stables.

The health and police committee today recommended the passage of an ordinance regulating the construction of livery stables in the city. The new ordinance as it will in all likelihood be passed provides that all such buildings shall be kept in a thoroughly sanitary condition, and that if they are not so constructed as to insure these conditions the owners may be forced, on 48 hours' notice to alter them.

The ordinance also provides for more fire escapes, and that no animals shall be kept anywhere in a stable except on the ground floor.

Neighbors Must Consent. Another provision says that no stable shall be built anywhere in the city except the written permission of two thirds the property owners living in the same block shall have been secured. The committee recommended that the theatre protection ordinance should not pass. This stipulated that a fireman should be kept in all theatres during performances therein at the expense of the theatre.

BURGLARS ENTER OFFICER'S HOME

While Officer E. G. Marsh of the second night relief was away from home making his rounds and protecting the sleeping householders of another part of the city from burglars, sneaky thieves and other kinds of thugs last night, his own house at 1045 East Grant street was broken into by some disrespectful night marauder with a view to burglary. The officer states, however, that the burglar was evidently scared away before he had time to take anything, as nothing was missing when the guardian of other people's peace returned. The attempt at burglary was made about 3:30 o'clock this morning.

NEW CLIFF HOUSE SOON TO BE BUILT

San Francisco, Oct. 8.—Preliminary work on the new Cliff house, San Francisco's famous seaside resort, which is destined to replace the structure destroyed by fire, began today. The contract for the rebuilding was signed by Emma L. Merritt, representing the Sutro estate and the San Francisco Rebuilding company. The estimated cost is \$42,549.
