

FURUSETH IS TO SPEAK

Monster Anti-Taft Labor Demonstration Will Be Held at the Armory Wednesday Night—The Unions Prepare.

Union labor men of Portland will voice their protest against the election of William H. Taft at a mass meeting Wednesday night at the Armory, when Andrew Furuseth will be the principal speaker.

Yesterday afternoon representatives of more than 40 labor unions of Portland met and completed the final arrangements for the big meeting of Wednesday night. Great enthusiasm was shown by the delegates present and it is anticipated that the meeting at the Armory will be the largest labor meeting held in Portland for years.

CHURCH ITSELF IS RESPONSIBLE

Rev. W. H. Heppie Says It Is Not the Power It Should Be.

WEAK, TEPID FAITH WILL NEVER CONVERT

Methodist Pastor Declares Members Too Ready to Hold Other Agencies Responsible for Indifference Toward Holy Things.

Taking as his text First Corinthians xiv:12, "Even so ye, forasmuch as ye are zealous of spiritual gifts, seek that ye may excel to the edifying of the church," Rev. W. H. Heppie of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church said yesterday morning:

"The church of Jesus Christ is nothing like the moral force it ought to be in these modern days. Its influence should be such as to touch all the vital points of our national life, and of every other nation's life. While church and state should forever be separated, yet the church should be such a mighty constructive force in the nation's life that it would be in a position to dictate a policy or terms of righteousness, justice and peace. The church should be an all-conquering, regenerating power in the life of today. It should speak with power and authority in every city and municipality. It should be the common parlance of the hour. As goes the church, so goes the city."

"The church is not at its best because the members are not seeking to excel in the building up of the church. How many are trying to distinguish themselves as mighty edifiers of the church? How many are investing their best in building it up? There are three things in which the church is wanting: "Men look with suspicion upon everything that cannot be weighed in the balance of reason, and with contemptuous disbelief upon everything that cannot be laid bare by the scalpel. To believe in Christ as the incarnate God, to declare Jesus as the only name given unto men by which they can be saved, to hold fast to the Bible as God's only hope of the world, as Gladstone regarded it, is to expose ourselves to the sneers and criticisms of so-called liberal and advanced thinkers, to be classified as 'back numbers,' and to be declared out of harmony with the supposed prevailing ideas and beliefs of the times."

"We are too ready to hold other agencies responsible for the indifference today toward the church and holy things when the church itself is in large measure responsible. We are not offering a mighty countervailing spiritual force that will sweep everything before it, and cause men to think of God, of their souls, of salvation and to tremble because of their sins. We need a revival of religious faith, and that right speedily. The very life of the church is dependent upon it. We shall lose our heritage if we do not have it."

SOME STRAIGHT-OUT ADVICE

Rev. J. Allen Leas Tells of Duties of a Young Husband.

Rev. J. Allen Leas, pastor of the St. James Lutheran church, gave one of the most interesting sermons delivered here for some time. Had the young men of the city all known of it, the church would have been even more crowded than it was. The subject of the divine discourse was "The Young Man as a Husband."

"If you're working for \$3 a week don't tell the lady of your heart's desire that you have Mr. Corey's stipend beaten badly. This deception before marriage is a bad thing, and keeps the divorce court in business, says Mr. Leas. Following is his sermon in part: "Falling in love may be possible after the marriage vow, but it is not probable. There is greater danger today of too short courtships than of those too extended. The busy grind of the divorce courts indicates above all the haste on the part of young people in the choice of life partnerships. A few broken trials at married life, repeated misunderstandings, and it is agreed that the two are not suited; in other words, they were mismatched and it would be better to separate. There are men, and women, too, who are too conscientious to part, and unable or too weak in character to make the needed amends. They cannot say, 'I'm sorry,' and are just as unable to forgive. It is a shame that there are so many lives thus practically ruined, in view of all the great possibilities that God had intended for them."

"Young man, be a man. Before you ask a young woman for her hand and heart, be sure that you can make a decent living, and that you will be able to support her. If she will make you happy, she must be in the home. "Be honest. If you only earn \$3 a week, tell her so. Then if she is willing to take the chances, you have done your duty in that respect at any rate. Be honest in your attention. No respectful young man can trifles with a woman's affections as with a toy. He cannot regard one way or thus anything to be set aside at will, and have a lasting regard for another. He should understand that an insult to one woman is an insult to the whole race of womankind."

"A true young woman, when she does give herself to the trust of a young man, gives the best, in fact all she has. She holds nothing in reserve. She will endure for him. She will sacrifice, she will wait, and give up other and better opportunities; and if, at last, before the altar is reached, she is thrown overboard, she has no recourse but to bear. If she has sufficient Christian character she will continue to hold up her head, but if that is not so, she may make shipwreck of life and honor. Who then, is the guilty one? It is time that our modern society learned to divide equally the blame of the evils that are so common in the domestic and social world."

GOD'S WONDERFUL WORK

Rev. Benjamin Young Declares Man Never Homeless.

"I will not leave you orphans, I will come to you. This verse of scripture, taken from John xiv:18, was the text of the sermon chosen for yesterday morning's services at the Taylor street M. 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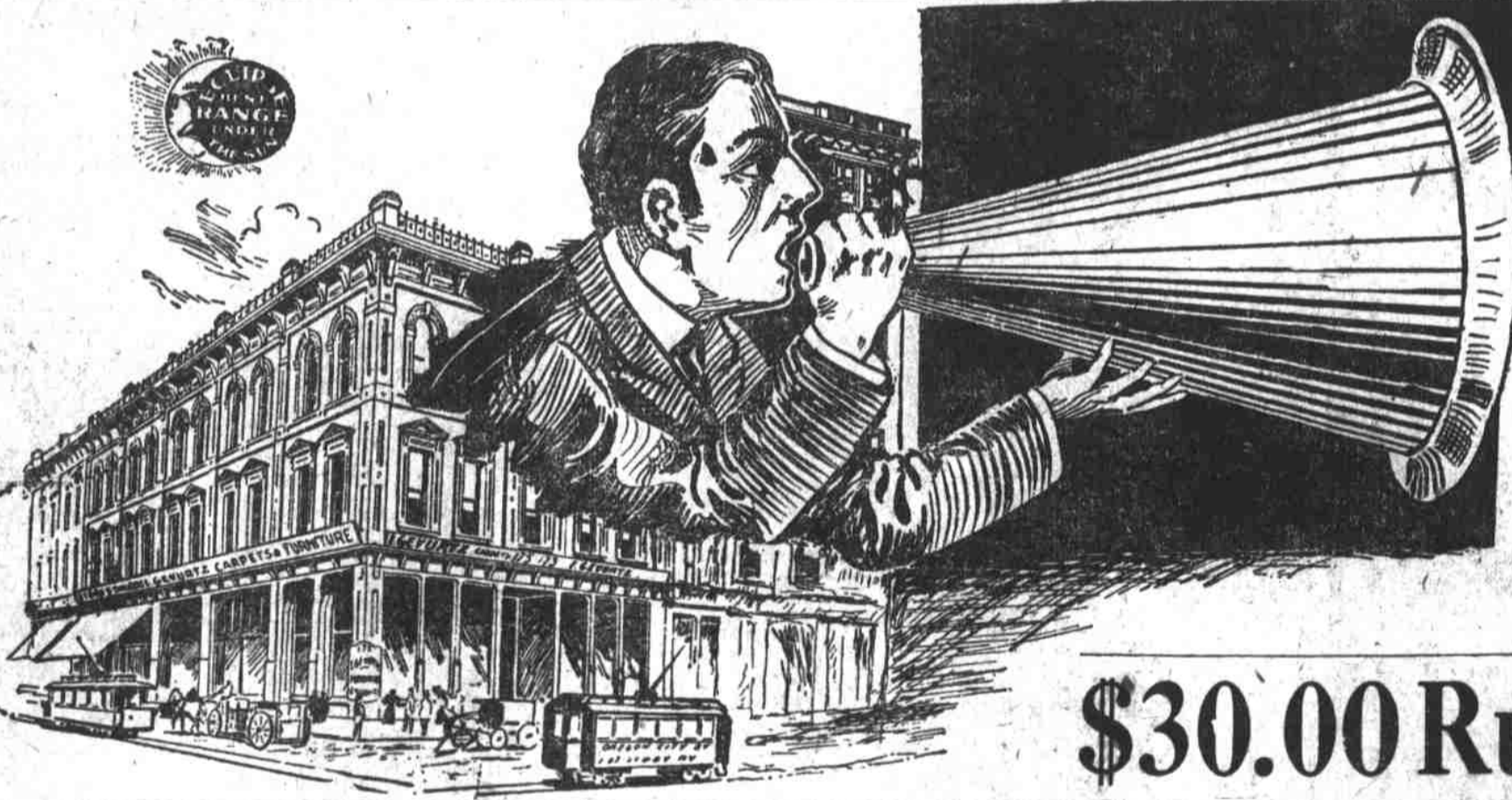
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
