"A KNIGHT FOR A DAY" ONE OF THE BEST SHOWS OF THE SEASON

"A Knight for a Day," which opened for a four nights' run at the Heilig last night, is something as pretty as has been seen in Portland for some time. It is something that is well worth seeing, not for the comedy, though there is considerable of that seasoning scattered through the two acts of the production, but for the singing alone.

OPINIONS ON "A KNIGHT FOR A DAY"

The play of "The Clansman," advertised to be produced in this city is a detriment to the colored people of the city and prejudicial to the best interests of the community and that it should be prohibited by the mayor and council, are the sense of the ministerial alliance of the Baptist churches of the city, as expressed in their meeting this morning.

The motion was introduced by Rev. E. B. Johnson, the colored preacher and pastor of Mount Olivet church, who said that wherever this play has been produced it has been attended with bad results; that it stirs up animosity toward the colored race and leads to acts of violence. Rev. Mr. Barr, a visiting minister, also of the colored race, spoke in support of the motion, showing that the play had been produced in Springfield, Ill., but four weeks before the bloody race riot in which many persons lost their lives.

Rev. W. T. Jordan said that the author, Tom Dixon, is a personal friend of his, and that though he believed that the events of that period covered by the play and the book, the reconstruction days in the south, could never be exaggerated, still he regretted that the book had been written and that a play had been from it. He expressed the opinion that the motion should be carried to let them die and said that he would vote for the motion. There was no dissenting voice when the motion was put to a vote.
