Cottage Grove, Nestled Among the Green Hills, No More Charming Townsite Could Be Imagined.

Cottage Grove is strictly a self-made city. Not a dollar's worth of foreign capital has been a factor in its existence or its growth. Its buildings are owned by its own people. Fortunes have been made and liberally expended in the upbuilding of the city. The founders built more wisely, perhaps, than they knew. ## BAKERITES BACK WILLIAM J. BRYAN

Sheriff Rand Says Bank Guaranty Plank Meets General Approval.

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 13.—"It looks as though the sentiment for Mr. Bryan in Baker county is as strong as was the sentiment for Governor Chamberlain at the June election," said Sheriff Ed Rand yesterday as he passed through Pendleton on his way to Salem, taking with him the murderer, Trapp, who entered upon his sentence today. "I am not a professional politician and I don't make any pretense of knowing it all when it comes to how the

people are going to vote, but I get over the country pretty much and I find the sentiment is strong in favor of the commoner.

"We have never had a bank failure in Baker county, but I want to tell you that the farmers over there are all strongly in favor of the Democratic bank guaranty plan. They want to know that their savings are absolutely safe, and in the face of the fact that there are mighty few places that have stronger banks than Baker City.

"The sheepmen are all thinking about the way that protective tariff keeps out the competition of foreign wool stuffs—until after it is shipped into this country and made into cloth—when a rebate is paid back on the stuff as it is shipped out.

"And the laboring men in Baker county are strong for Bryan. The way the Republicans turned down the injunction plank proposed by them and substituted that bluff of Mr. Taft hasn't won him any friends and they certainly look upon Mr. Bryan as a man who not only is now, but always has been a friend.

"I am not making any predictions, but I want to say again that the man who has his ear to the ground will find just about such a sentiment as existed for Governor Chamberlain now for Mr. Bryan."

## POLITICS STIR U. OF O. STUDENTS

It will be organized under the leadership of Walter C. Winslow of Salem, an alumnus of the university, who is now national organizer for Oregon, Washington and Idaho. ## HATS OFF TO THIS FLYING MACHINE

In Any Event One Would Have to Be Lively at Dodging.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Oct. 13.—Unpacking a steamer trunk, two suitcases and a couple of comic supplements in which he brought his diminutive aeroplane to this city, A. M. Herring is today preparing to make trial flights before taking the official test of the government. Herring will not make his trial flights at Fort Myer but will return there November 1 for the official test. If the government experts insist, he says he prefers a straight course, as he flies but six feet from the ground. His machine travels at the rate of an express train and there is danger of killing a spectator if the aeroplane should dip suddenly while making a circular flight.

Herring's machine weighs a little over 200 pounds, about one fifth the weight of the Wright machine. With it, he says, he will make a flight of 125 miles, carrying two men of about 200 pounds total weight, at a speed exceeding 85 miles an hour, without coming to the earth for fuel.

The Herring machine differs from the Wright machine in that it can use four or six propellers, although in the tests for the signal service only two will be used. The propellers are made shorter than Wright's and the blades at their widest parts are not more than four inches.

The engine, which is so small that it is packed in a dress suit case, will make 1,200 revolutions a minute, and the propellers will be geared up to about 1,300. The main plane is 20 feet long and 8 feet wide. The planes of the Wright machine are more than 50 feet long and about 6 wide.

## G. R. CONVENTION AT PENDLETON

Dates Are Also Announced for Meeting at Echo and Athena.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Oct. 13.—Montie B. Gwinn, chairman of the committee which has charge of the good roads convention to be held here shortly has announced the program for that occasion. As arranged by Mr. Gwinn and his committee the good roads convention will be held in this city October 22. On the following day a convention will be held at Athena and on the day following that a convention will be held at Echo. It is the desire of Judge Scott and the other gentlemen behind the good roads movement to hold three meetings in this county. Previously it was the intention to hold one of the outside meetings at Athena and the other at Milton or Freewater.

But it was finally concluded that the west end of the county deserves one of the conventions, so a meeting was scheduled for Echo. Farmers of the east end of the county will be asked to attend the meeting at Athena or the one here.

The meeting in this city will be held in the court house on the afternoon of October 22. Aside from the addresses a good musical program is being arranged and it is the intention to make the meeting the biggest occasion of that character ever held in the county.

## COLLISION NOT POSSIBLE NOW

Block System Invented by Idaho Railway Man Pronounced Perfect.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Oct. 13.—All the trains of the Northern Pacific, except the great division between Tacoma and Portland, are operating today under the new A. B. C. block system of train dispatching devised by A. B. Bestor, superintendent of the Idaho division.

The new system is claimed to be the most perfect installed anywhere and will revolutionize the business of train dispatching if the claims of its inventor are proved.
