

# LIFE TAKES WHEN DIED

### Mrs. Lundgren of Lents Sends Bullet Into Heart in the Same Yard Where Hegburn Was Clubbed to Death Three Weeks Ago.

### Brooded-Over Violent Death of Husband's Employe and Fact That His Body Lay Near House All Night— Gets Gun This Morning.

Still suffering from the shock she received when Charles Hegburn was killed three weeks ago near her home and the fact that his body lay by the side of the house all night, Mrs. Charles Lundgren of Lents shot herself in her front yard at 9 o'clock this morning, death coming instantly.

Every indication points to suicide, although Deputy Coroner J. J. Dunning, who was summoned to Lents, is inclined to believe it accidental shooting, but is making further investigations.

Mrs. Lundgren, aged 47, and the mother of two children, and whose husband is the proprietor of the wood yard at Lents, died within a few minutes after her husband's body lay all night after he was clubbed by Casper Blikenstoffer three weeks ago tonight.

Little Harry Lundgren, the most important witness against Blikenstoffer, is now without a mother, for it seems that the house at Lents has been marked by the dark angel for frequent visitations.

**Sudden Death Shocked Her.**  
Mrs. Lundgren who she had married Mr. Lundgren was Miss Ethel Gant of Woodland, Wash., was terribly shocked by the death of Hegburn, who was at the time in her husband's employ as a teamster. The fact that through an error the body was allowed to lie where it had fallen for nearly 24 hours preyed upon her mind constantly.

This morning she could stand it no longer. There was a revolver before paid house, to which she went to get the slightest attention, her husband says. He believed she scarcely knew where it was kept in a drawer of an old bureau. There were no cartridges near by, but Mrs. Lundgren hunted through the house until she found them.

At 9 o'clock this morning John E. Hammel, who has a blacksmith shop across the road from the Lundgren residence and wood yard, saw Mrs. Lundgren come out into the front yard. She had a revolver in her hand. She called to him that she could not make the weapon operate properly. Hammel started towards her to see what was turned and aimed at her.

**One Shot Is Heard.**  
This time the revolver was discharged. By this time Hammel was within 10 feet of Mrs. Lundgren with a fence between them. Seeing that the weapon was in working order he turned to retrace his steps.

When he again he saw her revolver discharged. Turning instantly he saw Mrs. Lundgren fall to the ground. The muzzle of the pistol had been placed against her breast and the bullet had entered the heart. Death resulted almost at once.

# EASY TERMS FOR REQUEST ENVELOPES

In order to encourage the letter-writing public and particularly the business men to use the special request envelopes issued by the department, the postal authorities have made a new ruling to the effect that in the future it will only be necessary to put up a small amount at the time the order is placed. Heretofore it has been necessary to deposit the full amount of the order stamped and with your name and address in the left-hand corner cost \$22.84. Several weeks were required in getting the orders filed and owing to this fact many business men complained that all this while the department had use of their money. Now all that is necessary is to deposit the actual cost of the envelopes, the balance to be paid when the goods are delivered. The cost is \$1.40 and this amount must be put up for each 1,000 envelopes.
