

WHY HISGEN AGAINST S. O.

Independence Party Candidate for President Tells How His Family Were Almost Ruined by Standard Oil.

Thomas L. Hisgen, candidate for the presidency on the Independence party ticket, spoke to an audience of 2,000 people last night at the Armory on the issues of the campaign, treating the attitude of the two old parties from his standpoint and arguing that the remedy for all existing evils of government was the support and success of the Independence party and its candidates.

In his address Mr. Hisgen contended that the old parties were owned and operated by the interests, the trusts and the magnates of predatory wealth. He said that the only way for the country to rid itself of the domination of the interests was for them to come to the support of the Independence party, which was not now nor ever would be associated with or friendly to the trusts.

illustrating why it was that the country should have an administration which would control the operations of the corporations. Mr. Hisgen detailed his own experiences with the Standard Oil company. He told of the commencement of himself and his three brothers in the business of manufacturing axis greases, of how when they had built up a large business, the Standard Oil company offered to buy their plant and when they refused, of the efforts of the corporation to put them out of business. He told of how agents of Standard Oil had warned the patrons of the Hisgen factory that if they handled the product made by Hisgen, the dealers could not handle Standard Oil products and how it came that to protect the Hisgen business it became necessary for the factory to go into the oil business. He related the long and bitter fight that had been waged by the Hisgen factory against the monopoly and of how, by going to the courts, the Hisgen factory had won its fight. As a result of this fight, oil in his state was selling for 10 cents a gallon whereas it had sold for 11 1/2c.

"The Main We Win"
The aim of the Independence party is to give the power of the government to the people where it belongs and not to a few idle hands. The party will hand the government over to the trusts, said Mr. Hisgen in outlining the position of the party and what it intended to accomplish. "The only way to accomplish these reforms is to drive the interests out of the government. We are going to do it, perhaps not today or tomorrow, but in the end the principles advocated by the Independence party will triumph. The party is not a dream of the night, something that is here to stay a moment and then pass into memory. It has come to stay, live and to live, and to live and to triumph for the betterment of the great mass of the common people of this country."

During his address Mr. Hisgen was interrupted by cries in approval of Traft and Bryan, Debs and Chaffin, but the speaker continued through his address without serious interruption.

Expected to See Hearst.
There was manifest disappointment at the failure of W. R. Hearst to come to Portland and partly in the fact that many people who had come under the impression that the New York editor would be one of the speakers left the building.

M. J. Malley, chairman of the state central committee of the new party, introduced Thomas Sweeney who served as chairman of the evening. Previous to the address of Mr. Hisgen several members of his party were introduced and made short addresses dealing with the work and objects of the Independence party. These speakers were Clement L. Pollock, Z. W. Craig, and H. V. Knickerbocker.

Mr. Hisgen and his party will leave today for Seattle and other Puget sound cities where the next meetings will be held.

BANK SHAKE HITS MANY

School, County and City Funds Are Tied Up in Farmers and Traders Institution at La Grande—May Reopen.

La Grande, Or., Oct. 12.—The failure of the Farmers & Traders National bank of this city to open its doors has been the chief topic of interest all over eastern Oregon today. J. W. Scriber, the cashier and virtual head of the institution, is a nervous wreck, and lies at his home under care of physicians.

While many conflicting rumors regarding the affairs of the bank are being circulated, it is known that no financial crisis is the cause of the trouble. The general impression is that Scriber has erred, and that never, since the failure of the Sumpter bank, in which he was interested some years ago, has the Farmers & Traders been on a sound basis.

The immediate cause of the crash was a certain note held by an Elgin bank as collateral, and purporting to be signed by N. K. West, a wealthy merchant and stockgrower of La Grande. Saturday morning, it is said, parties in Elgin, 25 miles from here, notified N. K. West that the note for \$2,000 of J. W. Scriber, on which his name appeared as security, was due. This, it is alleged, was Mr. West's first knowledge of the existence of such a paper, and learning that Mr. Scriber had just taken the train to Elgin, he secured J. W. Oliver's automobile and a race to get to Elgin ahead of the cashier began, with the chances all in favor of the auto, until it broke down.

It is stated that West arrived in time to see Scriber leaving up the note, which he had just paid. The men returned here and an investigation at the bank began at once, to ascertain to what, if any, extent the bank has suffered.

It is claimed that the cashier borrowed the \$2,000 at Elgin and put on the name of N. K. West as security. No charges are made against any other officers or employees of the bank. G. E. McCully, assistant cashier, had

all his personal money in the bank and even several months of back salary. The La Grande school district has about \$3,000 tied up in the institution, the county treasurer about \$20,000, the city about \$4,000 and the sheriff's office about \$3,000.

It is known that the La Grande National and the Eastern Oregon Trust & Savings banks offered to take over the affairs of the Farmers & Traders, but were denied the privilege of examining the securities.

Mr. Scriber declares that the institution is solvent, and says that his private fortune, commonly estimated at \$50,000, will be turned over to the creditors of the bank and that all its debts, as well as his own, will be paid dollar for dollar.

The last statement issued by the bank, September 23, shows deposits of approximately \$150,000. The cash on hand amounted to \$27,000.

Edward Blake 75 Years Old.
Toronto, Ont., Oct. 13.—Hon. Edward

Blake, who was for many years a member of the Canadian parliament and later was one of the foremost Irish home rulers in the British house of commons, quietly observed his seventy-fifth birthday today. Mr. Blake retired from the arena of politics some years ago, but he still takes a keen interest in all public questions affecting the welfare of either Canada or Ireland. During his stay in the Canadian parliament Mr. Blake was the leader of the Liberal opposition. In 1892 he was invited by a unanimous resolution of the anti-Farnellite faction of the Irish party to accept one of their seats in the commons and help them to fight for their cause. For some years thereafter he took a prominent part in the Irish movement and was one of the

most conspicuous figures in the lower house of the British parliament.
