CITY IMPROVEMENT BONDS ARE SOLD

At a meeting of the ways and means committee of the city council yesterday afternoon \$198,000 worth of improvement bonds were sold, the committee having voted to award all bids of more than 1/4 per cent. The largest buyers were:

United States National bank, \$25,000 at 1/4 per cent interest and 2 1/2 per cent premium; R. L. Dusham, \$21,000, par, accrued interest and 2 1/2 per cent premium; Canadian Bank of Commerce, \$50,000, par, accrued interest and 2 per cent premium; water board, \$24,500, par, accrued interest and 2 per cent premium.

In what was the sale of a quarter of a million dollars for immediate use was a question discussed at length by the committee and R. W. Lamson of the water board. It was decided to ask the city attorney for an opinion.

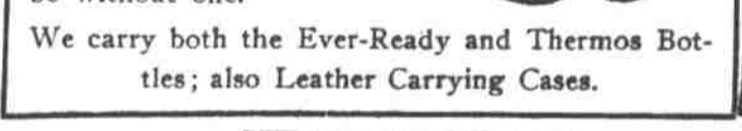

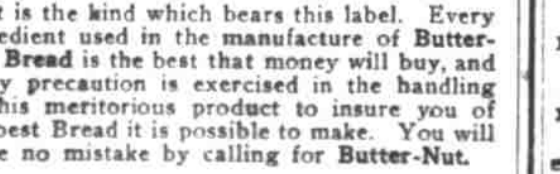
