

BAR VISITORS FROM ASYLUM

Superintendent Asks Charities Conference to Help Get Legislation Passed.

The closing session last night of the Oregon State Conference of Charities and Correction was most interesting, and addresses were made by Dr. R. E. L. Steiner, superintendent of the state insane asylum; by A. L. Mills, who is interested in the Open-Air sanatorium; by Rev. W. G. Elliot on "Public Health," and by Dr. S. J. Barrows, describing a personal visit to Count Leo Tolstoy.

Dr. Steiner told of the care that is being taken of the insane patients. He spoke of the soothing influence that music has upon the insane and said almost all the meetings are held out of doors to bring them in contact with nature. Flowers and plants are kept about them as much as possible, and it is hoped soon that a system of colors may be studied out so as to make some practical use of the insane person's instinctive liking for some colors and just as instinctive rage over others. He described the practice of allowing curious visitors to go through the asylum at all times because it is most humiliating to the patients and asked the help of the charities in getting legislation passed at the next legislature.

Mr. Mills lamented the fact that the government, while taking precautionary measures at all times against the spread of diseases among plants and beasts, makes no effort to protect its people against the spread of disease which is described the devastating strength of tuberculosis and emphasized the necessity of its proper treatment and isolation, and told of the good work being done at the Open-Air sanatorium.

Mr. Elliot gave statistical facts of the amount of money spent by the government on agriculture with nothing for public health, and told of the numbers that die every year from diseases which are accepted as natural. The organization of the committee of one hundred appointed by the National Association for the Advancement of Science was praised and he said they would probably obtain some results in this matter. They are seeking to establish a national bureau of health and the present administration and both the candidates for the next are in favor of it. It remains to educate public opinion.

Salem was recommended by the committee as the next place of meeting, and meanwhile measures will be taken to come in closer touch with all associated charities and corrections.

Constantinople, Oct. 14.—Reports from Salonica and Monastir today have convinced the Porte that Bulgaria is fomenting disorders in Macedonia to furnish an excuse for annexing that country to the new "Bulgarian independence."

Bulgarian officers are organizing bands in both Greece and Macedonia to receive, and are supplying them with arms and bombs. Agents of Bulgaria in all its principal Macedonian cities are trying to work up a sentiment for annexation to Bulgaria.

The news has been received here that England has fallen in with Russia's proposal and advised Turkey to accept the independence of Bulgaria and the annexation of Herzegovina and Bosnia to Austro-Hungary as accomplished facts, and demand a pecuniary compensation.

The floating of a Turkish loan in Europe is regarded as acceptable to the young Turk regime, provided it is secretly favorable to the recognition of Bulgaria's independence. A loan would cut the new regime firm in the saddle, and avoid a war that is not popular with the people.

It is reported here today that Serbia and Montenegro have been notified by Russia that the czar will safeguard their interests in the forthcoming conference of the powers, and it is thought to have had a quieting effect on the Servians, who were anxious to go to war with Austria.
