

# REPORTS FROM GILLIAM, KLAMATH AND OTHER COUNTIES SHOW THAT REGION EAST OF CASCADES WILL FAVOR BRYAN REMARKABLY.

Three jurors wished to lay the blame upon the contractors, Glebach, Joplin & Paquet, while the other three believed the men themselves were partially to blame. The body of John Jardine has not yet been recovered. Mattson lived for several days after the accident last Monday, but died in a local hospital, leaving a family.

# 75-VOICE CHORUS IS ORGANIZED AT O. A. C.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 14.—A chorus of 75 voices has been organized by Professor Gaskins, director of the School of Music, and is doing creditable work. It is the intention of the director to increase the chorus to 100 voices, and during the winter an attempt will be made to produce an opera.

# MORTOR TOO STRONG FOR STREETCAR

Streetcar traffic over the Fifth street line was delayed for more than half an hour from 1 o'clock this afternoon by the overturning of a mortor wagon at the corner of Fifth and Yamhill streets. The wagon, drawn by three mules and driven by C. R. Wilmoth, who is in the employ of C. J. Cook, was struck by car No. 320, northbound. The heavy wagon was on the track before Motorman Tietze saw it and the wet tracks made it impossible for him to avoid the collision.

# PHONY-GIRL DECOY GETS CLERK FINED

Long Beach, Cal., Oct. 14.—J. C. Leach, an employe at the Wolf-Adams drug store, is today being held in custody by police officers as a result of being accommodating to a very pretty little maid who asked him to refill a prescription calling for a cold quart of beer. As an ordinance forbids the refilling of liquor prescriptions, Leach is being held in custody for the offense.

# JOE COHN, BAD MAN GETS A LONG TERM

Joe Cohn, arrested Sunday by Detective Coleman and charged with vagrancy, this morning pleaded guilty to the charge before Judge Van Zante and was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail. He is a bad man, and the detectives suspect that he knows more than he will tell about some of the many holdups that have occurred about town recently. He runs a lodging-house at the southeast corner of First and Clay streets, which is said to be a thieves' hang-out.

# MILITIAMEN LEAVE CAMP ATASCADERO

Camp Atascadero, Cal., Oct. 14.—"I have never seen state troops that compare with the national guard," said Colonel Marion P. Maus, commander of the department of California, today, when the last contingent of the national guardmen had pulled out of camp for home stations. The last of the army of 2,000 citizen-soldiers will leave for home stations at noon. It required altogether 25 box cars and coaches to carry men and horses with the camp paraphernalia to the home stations. The militiamen had the camp streets cleared and the tents down long before daylight. A general assembly of state troops was sounded to enable the officers to get them into their respective trains.

# RIEMANN ABLE TO BEAT ONE CHARGE

L. A. Riemann, who was brought back from Grants Pass on a charge of forgery, was this morning discharged from custody by Judge Van Zante. It was claimed that he had altered the figures in a receipt. This was admitted by Riemann, but he said he had no intention of committing a crime. The prosecution failed, however, to prove that Riemann had altered the figures. Riemann is under arrest on another serious charge, that of having obscene pictures in his possession. The pictures were found in his pocket when he was searched at the police station.

# JOHN BARRETT COMES TO SEE HORSE SHOW

Arrangements for the entertainment of John Barrett, chief of the bureau of American Republics, are being made today by the Portland Thursday morning club. Barrett is expected to arrive in Portland Thursday evening and will be the guest of the club. The club is a social organization of the Royal Arcanum and will give a dinner to him in the Knights of Pythias hall at 11 o'clock. Barrett is a well-known horseman and will be in the city for the horse show Monday evening and there will be a joint meeting of the three councils of the Royal Arcanum at which Mr. Barrett will speak. Tuesday night Vancouver Lodge, Knights Pythias will tender him a reception. He will be in Portland until the twenty-first.

# WELLS PETERSON DIES FOR MATE'S PROSECUTION IN TURN HALLE

San Francisco, Oct. 14.—The schooner Marfield, creeping slowly into port today, bore to its last haven the body of Nels Christian Peterson, an obscure sailor who gave his life in an attempt to rescue his shipmates from death at sea. His sacrifice was in vain, for the storm which threatened the schooner subsided shortly after Peterson left the craft in an endeavor to carry a lifeline to the shore.

The tragic sea drama was enacted off Needle Rock on the Mendocino coast. A terrific southwest gale during the night drove the Marfield over the swirling waters toward the treacherous coast. Rain fell in torrents and huge combers broke over the little vessel's deck.

Believing the schooner would strike, Captain Detmer ordered all hands on deck and called for volunteers to carry a line to the shore. Peterson sprang forward, followed by Ax Jepsen and Eric Lundberg.

The pilot of a small boat and disappeared in the darkness. Then the storm calmed and when day broke the drifting small boat was seen, upset, with Peterson's body across it and the two other sailors clinging to the keel.

# PRAIRIE FIRE MENACES TOWN

Dallas, Or., Oct. 14.—A terrific prairie fire is sweeping this way fanned by a high wind. The city is in great danger of being wiped out. An arm of citizens with wet blankets and every other obtainable means of fighting the fire is battling with the flames. This afternoon the fire was sweeping across cornfields and seemed certain to reach the city. Thousands of home-seekers joined in the effort to save the town.
