

TWO MEN ROB THIRTY IN A LOG CAMP

Employees of Clear Lake Lumber Company Lined Up at Bunkhouse by Highwaymen — Ex-Employees Suspected.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Clear Lake, Wash., Oct. 15.—Two masked men last night held up 30 men in the employ of the Clear Lake Logging company and secured \$150. The robbery was the most daring that has ever taken place in Skagit county. Just as the men in the camp were getting ready to turn in at the bunkhouse two masked men carrying revolvers, appeared at the door. "Turn out here you fellows, and come quick," was the command of one, as the two leveled their revolvers on the men inside. The men were ordered to march out of the bunkhouse in single file and line up against the wall with their hands up. The holdups then selected two of the victims to go through the pockets of the rest, while they stood back a few feet with their guns covering the crowd. One of the searchers attempted to overlook a watch in a friend's pocket and was ordered to return and it when the searchers had completed their job. They were then forced to deposit the loot in a sack in one of the bunkhouses. The victims were then marched inside the bunkhouse. The robbers looked the door and disappeared in the darkness. In a few minutes one of the victims started to notify the sheriff of Skagit county, and a posse was organized. The men in the camp suspect two loggers who recently quit work.

TACOMA COMPANY OUSTED

Salvage Sale at Chehalis Does Not Materialize. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., Oct. 15.—A representative of the Washington Salvage company of Tacoma arrived at Chehalis last week, rented a storeroom in the business locality and received a receipt for the rent. The company then got out large posters and ran page ads in the papers announcing the date of a "salvage sale." Some of the goods arrived from Tacoma and they were placed in the storeroom. Before all the goods had been removed to the building from the depot the owners of the storeroom refused to let the Salvage company bring in any more, claiming that the salvage company was going to have a bankrupt sale, and that it would hurt the business of the home merchants. The Salvage company was given the alternative of vacating or putting up a bond for six months rent. The owners of the store contending that they had rented the storeroom with the understanding that the company was to remain permanent. The Salvage company, on the contrary, claims that the owners were fully aware of the nature of the business when the rent contract was made and the rent money paid. The company says it has been put to considerable expense in the way of advertising, freight charges and other expenses, and there is talk of a damage suit.

Taft Says West Virginia Will Stand Like Pennsylvania—On Southward.

He declared that the protective tariff had made West Virginia safely Republican like Pennsylvania and that it would remain so. Taft invaded Kentucky today, and tomorrow and Saturday he will speak in Virginia and Tennessee.

WORK CAR HITS PASSENGER CAR

Collision on San Francisco Line—Probably One Fatality—Many Hurt.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Oct. 15.—One woman was probably fatally hurt, two others were seriously injured and more than a dozen were slightly injured and frightened out of their wits, when a runaway work car crashed into a heavily loaded passenger car at the foot of a steep grade on Union street today. The car, which was on the way from the Presidio to the ferry, was filled with women and children. Those at the rear saw the wildly running car as it came thundering down the hill, and in a panic rushed to the front of the car. In the panic the women all tried to get out the front door at once, with the result that they were jammed and not one escaped. The heavy work car, gathering speed as it dashed down the hill, struck the passenger car with terrific force, smashing the rear platform and tearing its way into the inner compartment. Half a dozen women fainted when the crash came, and all thought death was certain. Mrs. Gabriel Boldron was thrown backwards on the floor of the car, striking her head. It is feared she will not survive. Mrs. R. T. Boldron was severely bruised and sustained internal injuries of a serious nature. Miss Camille Brouillard was badly cut by flying glass and severely bruised. The injured women were carried into near-by houses, where they received attention until physicians arrived. Motorman Quinn of the work car declared that the brakes were out of order, and that he could not control the car. He saved his life by jumping. Three other persons were seriously injured in streetcar accidents during the day. Mary Sullivan, a domestic, stepped from a moving Polk street car, according to the motorman, and sustained probably fatal injuries. Witnesses declare that the car had stopped and that the woman was struck by a car that was passing. Charles Brizzolari was flung from a car at a curve on Market street and sustained a fracture of the skull. Fernando Poole, a sailor, was struck by a car, receiving injuries that may cause his death.

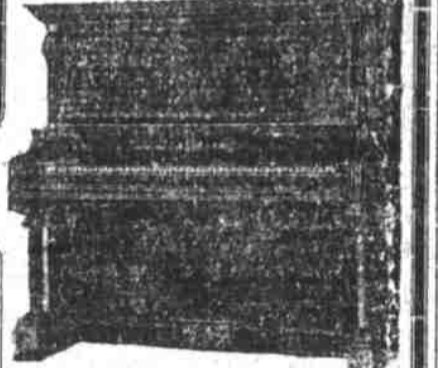
