GOVERNOR CHAMBERLAIN SAYS HIS OFFICE BELONGS TO WHOLE PEOPLE.

Governor Chamberlain Says His Office Belongs to Whole People.

Holding that the executive of a state or nation is the representative of all his constituents and not a part of them, and that the prestige of an executive office belongs to the whole people and should not therefore be used to further the interests of one political group at the expense of another.

In a letter to Chairman Sweek of the Democratic state committee, the governor makes known his views, and cites the fact that four years ago on similar grounds he declined to make addresses in Oregon in the presidential campaign.

"October 14, 1908.—Hon. Alex Sweek, Chairman, Portland, Or.—Dear Sir: I am in receipt of your esteemed favor inviting me to deliver addresses in the present political campaign.

"The office of chief executive, whether of state or nation is not the personal asset of the incumbent, but belongs to the whole people and not to a part or section of the people. It carries with it a prestige and honor which belong to the whole people and not to any one political party at the expense of another.

"I might add that within a few months I went before the people of this state to give an account of my administration as governor, and at that time discussed, as a candidate for senator, the various issues which are now before the people of the state.

"I believe this view is shared by the masses of our people, the more nearly in consonance with the ideas of the fathers will be the institutions, and the safer will be the moorings of the republic. Holding these views, I declined, as you may remember, to take part in this state in the presidential campaign of 1904, and while I remain in my present position I feel it duty bound to consistently adhere to this course.

"I believe this view is shared by the masses of our people, the more nearly in consonance with the ideas of the fathers will be the institutions, and the safer will be the moorings of the republic. Holding these views, I declined, as you may remember, to take part in this state in the presidential campaign of 1904, and while I remain in my present position I feel it duty bound to consistently adhere to this course.

"These policies were discussed by me at length in my campaign for the senatorship and there is not now nor has there been any room for difference of opinion as to the views I entertain. If I felt it entirely proper to enter upon a personal campaign at this time, I would not amend nor modify my views or policies in any particular. I have the honor to remain, yours respectfully, GEO.
