MARTIN THE MOTOR MAN SLAUGHTER

BODY FOUND BEATH DOCK

What has all the appearance of a murder is being investigated by the coroner and the police today. The body of Jack Nugent, an old resident of Portland and a well known man, was found this morning lying beneath the old dock of the Willamette Iron & Steel Works, at the foot of Everett street, south of the gas company's plant.

QUINCY WAY OF GETTING VOTES

Chicago, Oct. 17.—The national Democratic committee has an affidavit signed by a Minneapolis firm saying they bought a bill of goods from a New York wholesale firm, signing it as usual, and that then the salesman of the New York concern asked them to sign another order for the same goods, and write thereon:

"If we hold our ground or even lose a seat in one of our present strength, Bryan and Kern will be elected. The campaign attempted to scare the business element has failed miserably. Coercive methods tried on lesser business concerns and employees of all classes are resented bitterly this year. Men who submitted in 1906 and 1907, yielding to such coercion, now come out openly saying they will not be a party to such deceptive methods any more."

CYCLONE AT SEA IS VISIBLE 30 MINUTES

Ocean Park, Cal., Oct. 17.—Residents of Ocean Park were frightened today by a gigantic waterspout that formed about eight miles off shore and held a column of water 1,000 feet high for half an hour before sweeping down the coast. Heavy black clouds gathered about half past two between Point Vincent and Point Ferret, about 10 miles from Ocean Park. Suddenly sweeping down to the ocean the storm leaped the waves about 100 feet high. The waterspout was a good mile or more in diameter and was visible for 30 minutes. This was the first waterspout seen here for many years.
