DID SALMON GET FALSE TEETH LOST BY SEASICK PASSENGER?

Did the same salmon swallow the same set of false teeth? That is the question. It is bothering Dr. C. A. Cline of Prineville and Edward and George Slaton of the same place. It is not bothering S. H. Slaton, father of the boys, so far as is known, because he has departed from this orb of false molars and painful dental operations.

Two months ago, about a salmon, large, fat and not troubled with dyspepsia, was captured by an eager fisherman and hauled from the depths of the Columbia river. When the fish was being cleaned it was found that he had become possessed of a large, complete and perfectly preserved set of false teeth. They were not in his mouth, but in his stomach. The story was printed and went its way over the country with the papers.

Down at Prineville live three men. One is a dentist, Dr. C. A. Cline. He makes false teeth. At the same place are two young men, Edward and George Slaton. They read the story of the salmon equipped with the extra grinders and remembered things that had happened in the past.

S. H. Slaton was a resident of Prineville before his death. He used to wear false teeth and more than ten years ago had a set made by Dr. Cline. He went to San Francisco one time and returned by boat. On the way back the sea was rougher than a Prineville stage. In his general effort to throw everything about him overboard, Mr. Slaton heaved over his new set of false teeth.

Being a man who prized these things as mementoes which had been gained through strenuous toil or painful tribulation, Mr. Slaton was much grieved. He grieved to the captain who, being a thoughtful man, stopped the ship and went back to look for the teeth. He could not find them and Mr. Slaton came back to Prineville eating meat and milk. He never found the teeth and it was his custom to mention the fact that he had lost them, when and where, mingling the description and the merits of the molars together with his lamentations.

In this way the incident was fixed upon the minds of the dentist and of Mr. Slaton's sons. So, therefore, they, all three, are wondering whether or not the teeth which the salmon had evidently come by illegally are not those which Mr. Slaton by involuntary action tossed overboard some 16 years ago. If the possessor of the teeth would forward them to Dr. Cline it would settle the question, as he remembers their architecture. Should they be the same they will be preserved in a glass case as a relic and a reminder of that statement of holy writ which broad cast upon the waters will return after many days.
