

INDICATIONS OF HEAVY WEATHER

Telegraph Wire to North Head Goes Down During Night.

VESSELS KNOWN TO BE OFF THE RIVER

Wind Sweeps Swiftly Over Stream and Harbor, but Does No Damage to Shipping—Vessels at Anchor in the Stream.

That a heavy storm raged off the mouth of the Columbia during the night is believed from the fact that the wire to the North Head weather bureau station is down, falling trees having evidently wrecked it, as usual, in the first heavy storm of the season.

District Forecaster Beale ordered storm warning displayed at the mouth of the river last night, but says that aside from the fact that broke out at North Head is down, he has no other indication of heavy weather along the coast.

TWO COASTERS ARRIVE

Breakwater and Johan Poulsen Encounter Good Weather.

With about 300 tons of coal, 100 tons of miscellaneous freight and 2,000 cases of salmon on board, the Breakwater, Captain Macgregor, arrived at Oak Street dock last night from Coos Bay. She reached here at 8 o'clock and after several hours later than usual, but this was due to a large lot of freight having to be discharged.
