

LOW BOYCOTT FOR JUDGE

Peaceful Patrol of "Unfair" Barber Shops May Be Carried On, but the Word "Scab" May Not Be Banned About.

While enjoining the use of the word "scab" in and around the "unfair" barber shops of William G. Jones, and restraining the union men from using force or intimidation of any degree to keep employees or customers away, Circuit Judge R. G. Morrow has refused to enjoin the peaceful patrolling of the sidewalk by union pickets or the peaceful persuasion of employees, and has refused to interfere with the boycott.

Next Thursday afternoon a question of continuing the temporary injunction issued by Judge Morrow will come up for hearing before Presiding Judge G. A. Tamm. The temporary order is directed to local No. 75 of the journeymen barbers union and its officers, agents, servants and attorneys. Fred Fletcher is the president of the union. Cy Long is vice-president and T. M. Leabo, who is also a member of the state examining board, is the corresponding financial secretary.

The injunction order asked for by Jones' attorneys was more sweeping than Judge Morrow allowed. They asked that the patrolling of the sidewalk in front of any of Jones' shops be restrained, that the union men be compelled to refrain from persuading the nonunion employes to stop work, that the defendants be allowed to do nothing in furtherance of a concerted plan, or from going to the homes of the plaintiff's employes, or to these points as covered by the injunction.

No Violence, Says Judge.
Judge Morrow's order restrains the use of violence or intimidation of any kind and prohibits the use of the obnoxious word "scab," but it does not prevent the continuance of a peaceful boycott or the persuasion of employes or customers to stop work, provided it is done without disturbance or threats. The injunction order reads as follows:
"From compelling, inducing or persuading, or attempting to compel, induce or persuade, by threats, intimidation, force or violence, any plaintiff's employes to fall or refuse to work for him or at his said shops, or to leave his or their service."
"From the use of violent or opprobrious epithets accompanied with force or intimidation or violence calculated in any manner to prevent any person or persons from freely entering into or upon the plaintiff's premises, and from applying to any person or persons, or entering or about to enter the plaintiff's said shops at 84 Sixth street or 255 Alder street, Portland, or to any person, the word 'scab' or designating said shops or either of them as a 'scab shop.'"
No Threats Must Be Used.
"From congregating upon or about the plaintiff's premises, or the streets, approaches and places adjacent thereto and solitarily calling upon or soliciting passers-by or other persons to withdraw their custom and patronage from plaintiff, or intimidating plaintiff's employes or customers, or endeavoring them, or any other persons, from interviewing plaintiff or doing business with him, or in any such manner so as to induce or coerce, by threats, violence or intimidation any of the said plaintiff's employes or customers to leave his service or his place of business, or to refuse to enter the same."
"From maintaining, congregating at, near or upon the premises of plaintiff, or in the streets, approaches or places adjacent thereto any picket men, sandwich men or purveyors of printed or published matter calculated to coerce persons by mere force of numbers or by individual intimidation or violence from entering upon plaintiff's premises for custom or trade, or other personal reasons, or entering plaintiff's employ, or from in any way maintaining any of the same as pickets, sandwich men or purveyors of such information in a threatening or intimidating manner, to the injury of plaintiff's said business."

BELLINGHAM PLAYS LID FARCE-COMEDY

ATTEMPT TO SLAY PRIEST IN CHURCH

Chicago, Oct. 18.—An unsuccessful attempt was made yesterday afternoon by an unknown man, a Greek or an Italian, to assassinate Rev. J. K. Fielding, pastor of Corpus Christi Roman Catholic church. The would-be assassin prowled about the church until his opportunity arrived and he then aimed at the priest at very close range. Father Fielding struck up the weapon and the great grazed his scalp. At the same instant he knocked down his assailant, who on regaining his feet ran from the building, knocking down women and children as he fled. At the foot of the stairs he turned and fired a second wild shot and resumed his flight, pursued by a number of citizens and street pedestrians who chanced to be passing. The would-be assassin made his escape.
