

# SEE OFFICIAL TAKES OWN LIFE

Wealthy Pittsburg Broker Puts Bullet in Brain After Telephoning to Hotel Manager—Leaves \$100,000 Life Insurance.

(United Press Lease Wire.) San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 20.—With a bullet in his brain, Otha M. Hartzell, wealthy broker of Pittsburg, is dying at the Cottage hospital after removal from the Hotel Rafael, where, alone and against his will, he attempted to take his own life last night. Hartzell left a note to the hotel manager carefully explaining that he was not insane, but that his great wealth, held nothing for him, and he had resolved to leave it to his wife. The life insurance he held so valuable was insured by him for \$100,000 to relatives. Hartzell, who was one of the Carnegie steel millionaires, had been a guest at the Hotel Rafael for six weeks. He appeared to be contented and happy enough to enjoy life. To friends he spoke of a trip to Japan that he was planning. Hartzell telephoned to Manager Orpin of the hotel to come to his room within fifteen minutes. Orpin waited the designated time and then went to the room. There he found Hartzell in a chair with a bullet hole in his head and the revolver lying near him. The man was in a stupor, from which he was not recovered. Hartzell left a letter for A. T. Downer, a San Francisco friend, and a telegram for his son, L. M. Hartzell, head of a department of the Carnegie Steel company, Rev. W. H. Hartzell of Minneapolis, a brother, and for his executor.

## MRS. O'CONNELL SAYS PIGGOTT IS MISTAKEN

Mrs. Julia O'Connell, of Howe's addition, says she is not the "next friend" of C. H. Piggott, the post laureate of the Oregon bar. In addition to this she says she has no other things about Mr. Piggott which are not complimentary. She also says that by the time she was through with Mr. Piggott he will never again say, either in court or out, that she is not of strong mind. Mrs. O'Connell's attorney is called forth by a suit brought by Piggott against Charles Downer alleging that Downer exerted undue influence over Mrs. O'Connell in a realty deal. Mrs. O'Connell says that Piggott used to be her attorney, but that she paid him all she owed him and dismissed him, turning her legal business over to W. S. Bufford, an attorney in the Sweetland building. She gave Piggott, she says, some \$150 in cash for his services. Then he wanted more. She offered him an equity in some property amounting to about \$500, but he wanted her to mortgage her home for \$800 to him. She refused. After severing relations with Mr. Piggott, Mrs. O'Connell sold some property to Downer for \$5,000. Now Piggott has brought suit against her, alleging that the property is worth \$5,000, that Mrs. O'Connell is under the influence of Downer and that the latter is defrauding the woman.

"My thanks are due to the president for affording my subjects, by your visit, an opportunity to give new proof of their sincere attachment to your countrymen, and I also wish you to convey to the president this message: That Japan's historic relations of good understanding and genuine friendship with the United States, I shall count the valued heritage of my reign. "It shall be in the future, as in the past, my constant aim and desire to weld the ties of amity uniting the two countries into indissoluble bonds of perfect accord. "I trust that the same success so far attending your voyage may be with you to the end. "Probably the most interesting feature of the day's program was luncheon given by the emperor personally, with the princess, in honor of Admiral Sperry, Ambassador O'Brien and the flag officers. Ambassador O'Brien presented Admiral Sperry to the mikado. Prime Minister Komura and Naval Minister Satto were prominent in the ceremonies, which were most pleasant and gratifying to all concerned. "After the extensive celebrations of the day and the dinners and entertainments, Admiral Sperry and his officers are resting tonight at Shiba palace.

## JAPANESE PEOPLE AND PRESS PROFESS AND ACT GOOD WILL

Tokio, Oct. 20.—Admiral Sperry today in person conveyed an expression of good will from President Roosevelt to the emperor of Japan and that of friendship and the whole attitude of hosts and guests is that of good feeling. The Japanese press is advocating an "honest understanding by America and Japan of the position of the two countries and the eastern problem. The Japanese people are making every effort to make the men of the fleet enjoy the visit and they are succeeding admirably. The entire reception, considering its many pleasant by far surpasses for elaborateness any yet given the fleet on the world cruise. The emperor and empress give audiences to the officers and staffs of the fleet and it was on this occasion that Admiral Sperry and the mikado exchanged greetings. After the audiences an elaborate luncheon was served in honor of the officers, with Naval Minister Satto as the host. Tonight the naval cadets, guides and interpreters gave a dinner to the blue-jackets. This was one of the most interesting events of the reception. The American sailors had great fun with the Japanese boys and the other was a great success. Everyone is looking forward with much pleasure to the great reception to be given by Admiral Togo tomorrow at the imperial gardens. These gardens have not been opened to the public since the great reception of the heroes of the Russian war. Extensive preparations have been made for the reception and it is expected to be one of the most beautiful functions in the history of the land of cherry blossoms. There has been no suggestion of unpleasantness whatever during the visit here and there is every prospect that the full program of entertainment will be carried out without the slightest hitch.

Neither President Childs nor Director-General Nadeau expect such an outcome, but while they decline to admit it is believed that Reed's action relieved a situation which had become extremely embarrassing, inasmuch as Mr. Reed was under contract at \$400 per month for a period of four years. Will Not Discuss Cases. Exposition officials this morning refused to discuss the Reed resignation. It is understood that Mr. Merrick's resignation will be tendered within a day or two. What will be done toward the vacant chair could not be learned. The resignation of Reed of the exposition will be carried along, however, without any interruption. Reed's French passport has been returned with \$100.00 to be ready for a passport which he says he can obtain at once.

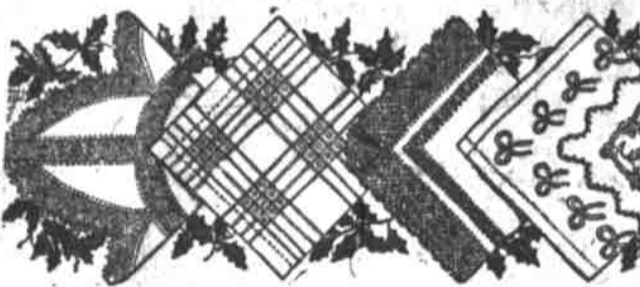
