

HOPING AMELIE WILL KEEP OUT

Portugal's Dowager Queen an Undesirable Because Reds Hate Her So.

(United Press Lined Wire.) Lisbon, via Badajoz, Oct. 20.—Started by Dowager Queen Amelie's large transfer of money from Lisbon to London, British royalty has delicately hinted that it hopes her majesty is not going to move into England. The objection to the queen is purely political. The Portuguese "reds" hate her as bitterly as they hated King Carlos. King Edward fears further attempts on her life and does not want them to occur in England. The task of protecting her would be a source of constant worry to the government. Just what form the message took that hinted that her majesty was an "undesirable" is not known. It is understood that it did not pass through diplomatic channels, but was delivered privately and as secretly as possible. The queen cannot be kept out of England, but it is taken for granted that she will not go where she is not wanted. When the queen's physicians recently advised her to leave Portugal and its tragic associations, King Victor of Italy asked her to make her home in his country. It was semi-officially announced that she had accepted his invitation. In the past few weeks, however, she has made such heavy remittances to Contis and the Bank of England that it is suspected that she has changed her mind and intends to invest her entire private fortune in Great Britain.

LAMBERT DEMKES, OLD RESIDENT, IS DEAD



Lambert Demkes, an old resident of Portland, died at his residence, 549 Yamhill street, Sunday, October 18. Mr. Demkes was born in Rees-on-the-Rhine, Germany, in 1826, and came to this country in 1849, settling in St. Louis. He established himself there in the tailoring business, remaining until 1875, when he came to Portland. He soon after purchased property at the corner of Yamhill and Chapman streets, which he improved and where he resided until his death. He married Caroline Foss, in St. Louis in 1849, and they celebrated their golden wedding here in 1899. Mr. Demkes is survived by his wife and three daughters, Mrs. J. G. Whitehurst, Ivanho; Mrs. Conrad Stark, 509 Clay street, and Mrs. William J. Standley, Portland Heights. He was a familiar figure on the streets until a few months ago, when he began to fall from old age and its attendant infirmities. He was a militant Swedenborgian in religion and was the father of the Portland New Church society.

CONTRACTOR MISSING; FOUL PLAY FEARED

D. C. The police detectives are searching the city for Frazer, who is described as 46 years old, tall and thin. Kennedy of 906 East Main street, and also had the contract for a new building at Third and Ash streets. Another missing man is J. A. Carthon of Fairview, on the O. R. & N., who has been on the absent list since October 8. He is a blacksmith, and since his disappearance his shop has been attached by a Portland firm. Saturday night the place was entered and a number of tools stolen. Two St. Johns boys, George Nichols, aged 12, and a boy named Wamsley, aged 14, have run away from their homes, having planned to travel together, it is believed.

SCOTT JEFFERSON IS FOUND GUILTY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Roseburg, Or., Oct. 20.—Scott Jefferson, a Yoncalla hotelkeeper, was convicted on a charge of selling liquor in violation of the local option law. The jury was out 35 minutes. This is the second case of its kind to be tried before a jury at this term of court, the other case being against J. Falbe, a restaurant keeper. The evidence against Jefferson was given by A. C. Rexroad, a local blacksmith, and a man by the name of Dan Robin, a local option detective, employed by the state league. According to their testimony, they procured the evidence by purchasing whiskey from the defendant in his hotel on Sunday afternoon, October 11, and by two bottles purchased of Jefferson the next morning.

SOCIALIST-LABORERS FAIL TO GET ON

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 20.—The Socialist-Labor party, which named its complete ticket at a convention held September 8, has failed to get on the official ballot for the November election. September 22 the party submitted its list of candidates, but sent no fees to the secretary of state and the list was returned. Subsequently the supreme court decided that the fee provision was constitutional and the party leaders decided to file only the list of presidential electors. This list was received today by the secretary of state, but was rejected because not filed within 30 days of the general election.

WRECK OF LABOR ALL NATIONS IN UNIONS INTENDED LINE TO SETTLE

Gompers Says G. O. P. Means Pairing Off as England-Austria, Austria-Turkey and Turkey-Bulgaria. That Very Thing—Labor All for Bryan.

(United Press Lined Wire.) Chicago, Oct. 20.—Samuel Gompers arrived here today to address a monster labor meeting tonight. He will appeal to the laboring men to vote for Bryan and the Democratic ticket. "There is no doubt there is a deliberate intention on the part of the Republican leaders to wreck the labor unions of the country," said Gompers in an interview this afternoon, "by the depletion of their treasuries and by proceeding criminally against their members under the Sherman anti-trust act. There is a complete revulsion of feeling against the Republicans in this country and a unanimous feeling in favor of Bryan."

EXAMINER GATCH IS APPOINTED RECEIVER
