Alfred E. Smith. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Oregon City, Or., Oct. 21.—Alfred E. Smith, 75 years of age, died yesterday at his home in this city.

He was born in London, England, and came to America in 1852, settling in Astoria, Ore. Thirty-five years ago he came to Oregon and for 20 years lived on a farm at Carus, coming to Oregon City to reside one year ago.

He is survived by a wife and the following children: Mrs. B. Rosenstein, Mrs. C. A. Coffman, Mrs. Harry Hutchinson, John E. Smith and Harry Smith of Portland and William M. Smith and Mrs. C. A. Monell of Oregon City.

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FIGHTER AT SEA DROWNED HIMSELF

Thinking He Has Killed Fellow Passenger—Antagonist Little Hurt.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Oct. 21.—Passengers on the Red Star liner Kronland saw a desperate knife fight between two steerage passengers while the vessel was in the English channel not far from Dover, several days ago.

The first cabin passengers were attracted forward by the noise of the fight. They gazed down on the forecastle deck, where Heinrich Miller and Nicholas Trausch of Luxembourg were struggling to gain a knife that Miller had at his belt.

Finally Miller managed to secure the weapon and he decked it hurriedly toward him, plunged the steel into Trausch's breast. Wrenching himself free, he whirled to the rail and leaped into the sea.

The Kronland was put about and boats were lowered, while the ship's surgeon attended Trausch.

The man in the water saw the boats approaching and swam from them. After a short race in which the boats steadily gained, Miller ceased swimming and sank without a struggle.

Miller was the only one who was a superficial wound. The knife blade had been deflected from the heart by a rib.

MINING SUIT WON WITH A WINCHESTER

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Bernardino, Cal., Oct. 21.—Harvey Phillips, a desert miner, attacked E. L. Monroe, a well known mining man, with a rifle yesterday at a deserted cabin four miles south of here.

John H. Mott of the student volunteer league is the presiding officer of the convention, while Dr. Shuler, president of the Y. M. C. A. of Chicago, is the general secretary.

The aim of the convention is to devise and present effective means to secure the cooperation of the church in efforts to win students to high Christian living by means of the English Bible.
