# SUSPECTED OF HAVING KILLED BUTTERWORTH

## AUSTRIAN TROOPS ATTACKED BY HORDES OF REVOLUTIONISTS

## ARRESTED BY VANCOUVER POLICE

### Chief Secrist Holds B. D. McLean, Who Answers Description of Man Wanted—Jeweler Was Shadowed Before Being Murdered.

In the arrest at Vancouver last night by Chief of Police Secrist of that place of a man who gives the name of B. D. McLean, the sheriff and his deputies believe that they have the man who murdered Harry T. Butterworth at St. Johns Tuesday night. The man is being shadowed by the sheriff this afternoon at Vancouver.

Aside from this, the newest development in the mysterious murder case is that Harry T. Butterworth was shadowed and followed by a man who answers the description of the arrested suspect, just before he was murdered. Information to this effect was given to Chief of Police Secrist by Everett Billen, a 14-year-old school boy of St. Johns. The boy says he saw the man watching Butterworth through the window, and later following him into and out of the moving picture show.

Watched Butterworth. Everett Billen, or Ray Billen, as he is commonly called, was standing on the street in front of Butterworth's jewelry store Tuesday night selling tickets to the skating rink. He saw a man standing outside the jewelry store and intended watching Butterworth through the window. Butterworth was at the time working at his table.

Shortly afterward the jeweler closed up his store, and coming out went into the moving picture show, which is a few doors away. The man who had been watching him immediately followed him in. A short time afterwards Butterworth came out again and started up the street toward his home. A few minutes later the strange man also came out.

Having no particular interest in the stranger the boy paid no farther attention to him, and when he looked around after a few minutes he had disappeared. Ray Billen is a little hazy in his ideas as to the time that elapsed between the emergence of Mr. Butterworth from the moving picture show and the time that he was followed by the stranger. At first he said it might have been 10 or 15 minutes—he was not sure—but afterwards he stated that Mr. Butterworth did not get about a block down the street and was opposite the tailor shop when the man came out.

Mr. Butterworth was arrested at Vancouver on the night of the murder. He is a close-cropped man, about 5 feet 8 or 9 inches tall, with a close-cropped mustache, dark clothes, shoes and a light colored hat. This tallies very well with the description given by the chief of police's office at Vancouver of the man arrested there last night. This man has a light, close-cropped mustache, a light colored shirt, a dark tie, dark clothes, is about 5 feet 8 or 9 inches tall, and when arrested had a revolver. This last circumstance, together with the fact that he tells of conflicting tales, can give no good account of himself, and appears to think that he is being shadowed by a man named "Everett." It is extremely probable that he is the same man who was seen by Butterworth shortly before the latter was shot to death and robbed of a valuable diamond ring.

Acts Like Dog Fiend. The man was arrested last night on information from Chief of Police Black of St. Johns that a strange man had been seen going from St. Johns in the direction of Vancouver.

## SWIFT SHIFT MANY PEOPLE BIG COMPANY OF POWERS IN EAST REPORTED KILLED IS UNDER FIRE

### Japanese Diplomats Desire Alliance of America, England and Japan, and Propose Conference to Settle Control of Orient.

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, Oct. 22.—Open warfare has been in progress in Bosnia and Herzegovina for 10 days and scores have been killed, according to information brought here today by the Montenegrin agent. More than 120,000 Austrian troops have been attacked by insurrectionists in the annexed territories and the fighting has been continuous. So far as is known no pitched battle has taken place, as the insurrectionists are greatly outnumbered by the Austrians, but their guerrilla tactics have been very effective.

The situation is so serious that the Austrian government has rushed reinforcements to the aid of the border troops. Through strict censorship, the agent said, the Austrian government has suppressed all reports of the situation as it really is. Anarchy exists in the eastern and southern sections of the annexed territory.

### National Life Has Been Secretly Investigated for Several Days—Differences in Mortgage Values Are Shown in Court.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—That an investigation of the affairs of the National Life Insurance company of the United States of America, operating in Oregon, Washington, California and Idaho, has been going on here secretly for many days was testified by John A. Brinkerhoff, attorney for the Illinois state insurance department, before Master-in-Chancery Zelsler yesterday in a hearing for the purpose of determining whether or not the company is solvent.

Mr. Brinkerhoff would not divulge what the department's investigators had found, nor why the work had been done under cover. The testimony brought out, however, that the investigation was an unusual thing, for the law requires an examination of such concerns' affairs only once in two years. The last previous examination occurred in June 1907.

### MISSING, MAY BE STARVING

(United Press Leased Wire.) Hot Springs, Wash., Oct. 22.—Although two searching parties with a thorough knowledge of the mountains are searching the country for trace of Fred W. Kloeber, brother of Dr. J. S. Kloeber of Green River, Hot Springs, and Julius Klummler, chief clerk of the Green River Hot Springs hotel, who have been missing since Monday morning, no trace has been found, aside from a light trail through the mountain snow which ended in a tract of timber.

At the head of the searching party are Dr. Kloeber and Charles Hurst of North Yakima, who knows the region about Hot Springs like a book. Leading the second party is Arthur Denmore. Dr. Kloeber's party started north up the canyon early this morning and Denmore's party went over the summit. It was agreed before starting that the searching parties should meet on the banks of May creek before tonight if the missing men are not found.

### BERNHARDT LEAVES STAGE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, Oct. 22.—At the climax of her career, Sarah Bernhardt, regarded by millions as the greatest living actress, has reached her sixty-fourth birthday today and the time of her retirement from the stage.

## TEN MILLIONS OF OILY COIN

### That for Standard's Stockholders Next Month, and Better Later.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Oct. 22.—Ten million dollars will be distributed among the stockholders of the Standard Oil company next month, according to a report today, following the announcement that the board of directors would meet next month to name the quarterly dividend. It is said that the regular dividend of \$10 will be ordered. For the first quarter of next year, however, the Standard will probably declare a dividend of \$15 a share, which is equivalent to about \$18,000,000.

## FINANCE KINGS TO GAMBOL HERE

Recreation "Spot" Will Be Established Near Harman's Lodge.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., Oct. 22.—The Weyerhaeuser Timber company will establish a hunting lodge on Aspen lake, just west of upper Klamath lake, and not far from E. H. Harman's lodge at Pelican bay. The timber bordering the west shore of the upper Klamath is owned by the Weyerhaeuser, as is also the bed of Asher lake, which is about six miles long, and a mile and a half wide. Ducks and geese are plentiful on the lake and the mountains are good hunting grounds for bear and deer. Wild rice is being planted in the marshes on the edge of the lake this fall.

## OSPREY MAY BE SAFE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., Oct. 22.—There appears to be no doubt but that R. D. Hume's gasoline schooner, the Osprey, and her entire cargo were lost when beached at the mouth of the Rogue river Monday night. It is believed that the Osprey was saved. No mail from that locality has been received since the accident and there is no telephone communication. No lives are believed lost.

## RAILS WILL SOON CONNECT WITH MINE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Huntington, Or., Oct. 22.—The steel gang of the Northwest railroad, having caught up with the graders, the work of laying steel was suspended today. As soon as some heavy lifts are completed, work will be pushed as fast as possible. Thirty-five miles of rails are laid over half the distance to the Iron Horse mine, which has a great lot of ore on the dump waiting to be shipped to the smelter.

## MISSING, MAY BE STARVING

Green River, Washington, Men Who Left Monday on a Hunting Trip Through the Mountains Have Not Been Heard Of.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Fred Kloeber and Klummler were lightly clad and carried no provisions. They intended being absent from Hot Springs but a few hours. They failed to return Monday night and Wednesday morning Dr. Kloeber and other friends of the missing men became thoroughly alarmed and the first searching party took up the trail of the hunters. They followed a light trail across a hogback through a light fall of snow, but the trail ended in a dense tract of timber.

## STANDS BY HER HUSBAND

Mrs. Magniss, Who Was Adah Gorman, Discusses Her Marriage.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 22.—Mrs. Charles Joseph Magniss, daughter of the late Senator Gorman of Maryland, was reported to have left the city this morning, but this afternoon she appeared at the jail and called upon her husband, who is incarcerated on the charge of being a deserter from the navy.
