

HOBSON SPEAKS AT OREGON CITY

Packed House Greeted Hero of the Spanish-American War.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
 Oregon City, Oct. 22.—Captain Richmond Pearson Hobson, the hero of the Merrimac, was the hero of the hour last evening in this city, and from the large attendance in Shively's opera house, which was crowded to standing room, it was evident that it was "Hobson night" in Oregon City. At 8 o'clock Captain Hobson, accompanied by State Chairman Sweeney, T. J. Murray, G. J. Smith and H. D. Waggoner of Portland, arrived by car in this city.

Senator Hedges introduced the speaker, referring to him as the hero who, with his seven men, sunk the Merrimac in the narrow strait between the harbor and the sea, and completely bottled up the Spanish fleet, doing the act under a galling fire from the Spanish batteries.

Captain Hobson expressed his pleasure at being on the Pacific coast, whose people, he said, were in the foremost rank of the whole white race. He referred to the coercion by the factory lords back east, holding the threat over their employes to close the mills, if Bryan was elected. In the great west the right of a free ballot, the weapon and shield of the citizen, was recognized, and it is the difference between a free American citizen and a Russian serf.

The Republican Party.
 He referred to the Republican party as the party founded by Hamilton, the party of a strong centralized government, tending toward an oligarchy; and the Democratic party as that of the common people, the party that stands for a government of the people, by the people and for the people, and today is also a party of peaceful, industrial revolution.

He denounced government by injunction as a usurpation, because courts were never organized to govern the people, and that is the duty of the founder of that new species of government. Today that party fosters interests that if permitted to go on will destroy the people.

"Does the present system of tariff justify from a protection standpoint? Our infant industries needed protection, but they have now grown into giants," he declared. "Today this protection is for the benefit of trusts and combinations, to our injury. As to protecting labor, the average wage of the protected steel and iron workers is \$1.30 and that of the non-protected railroad man is \$1.75 per day. The 'protected' capitalists of industry are responsible for the influx of foreign labor to glut our labor market."

Scores "Protective" Tariff.
 "Away with such a 'protective' tariff. Let us conquer the markets of the world and that would increase the demand and wages would go up and stay up."

"The legislature was once the people's branch, now it is Joe Cannon's. At the last session a petition signed by three-fourths of the house of representatives was presented to Speaker Cannon to take up a certain bill, but it was turned down. As long as the Republican party is in power no reforms can be had, because Joe Cannon is there to block them. There are half a dozen Joe Cannons in the senate, to turn the people down in that body, and the Republican convention that nominated Taft opposed the popular election of United States senators."

The speaker showed the aggressive position taken by Japan and hence the need of a stronger fleet on the Pacific ocean.

"The Pacific slope," he said, "without this protection is helpless. Who shall be mistress of the Pacific ocean, America or Japan? This question must be decided and we must have men and ships to decide the question. The white man does not own the Pacific coast until he control it. President Roosevelt sees the necessity of more warships, but a Republican congress turns him down." The speaker then eulogized Bryan, the statesman, the man of the people and the great Commoner, and concluded.
