

# DEVELOPMENT CONGRESS AT ROSEBURG

### Better Roads for Oregon Is Keynote of the Meeting Which Opened This Morning—Francis H. Clarke Talks on Coos Bay's Needs.

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 23.—The Oregon Idaho Development congress was opened with address of welcome by Dexter Rice. He told of the resources of this section of the state; how mild the climate is and how the abundance of good, pure water made it the mecca for all lines of horticulture pursuits. He then introduced Colonel E. Hofer of Salem, who dwelt upon good roads. He favored convict labor with 50 and 40 men in gangs. He said in the month of time the state would have enough crushed rock to build fifty miles of road. He advocated free labor in the way and especially of the Roseburg-Coos Bay roads where an abundance of material is at hand.

He said Salinas had been advocating paved streets for the past 10 years, and had just got at it, and now they were crying because they had not done it 20 years ago. He spoke of the great advantages of the Portland-Salem electric line, and advocated the extension of the line through the state.

# POPE CONFRONTS THE MODERNISTS

Rome, Oct. 23.—Catholics here are discussing an announcement in the Osservatore Romano, the Vatican organ, that the congregation of the propaganda, which has hitherto nominated the American bishops, has been dissolved and superseded by the consistorial congregation, which is to be presided over by the pope himself. This announcement is taken to mean that the recent trouble over the appointment of a coadjutor for the San Francisco diocese has led Pope Pius to take the reins of the government of the American church into his own hands, so that there may be no more discussion of modernism.
