HISGEN DEMANDS NAMES OF DONORS

Hearst's Man for President Resorts to Open Letter Campaign Tactics.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Toledo, Ohio, Oct. 23.—A request for the name or names of the contributors of \$300,000 to the campaign fund of "Democracy" and the choice of Bryan's political friends, are the salient features of an open letter addressed to the Democratic party nominee by Thomas L. Hisgen in an open letter published today.

The letter begins by denying that President Roosevelt was the author of the charge that the donation came from the Standard Oil company and that an answer to the question is not due the president but is due to Hisgen.

The Hisgen candidate declares that the question demands an answer because the people are wondering who contributed so large an amount and why.

Proof pointed to the Standard Oil company, continues the writer, and rather than explain this situation to the people, Mr. Mack finally stated to the newspaper men that he had made a deliberate mistake about the \$300,000 and that he really did not have it.

"Now, Mr. Bryan, how is the president to know when a friend and campaign manager is telling the truth and when he is telling a falsehood? Either Mr. Mack's statement that he had the money is a falsehood or the statement that he did not have the money is a falsehood. Which is the falsehood? How is the president to know? How is the public to know?"

You say that you made a false statement, and you apologize for it. That is right. But must the president apologize because your friend Mr. Mack makes a false statement? The president is not responsible for Mack, nor for Mr. Mack's falsehoods. You are responsible for Mr. Mack, Mr. Bryan. You are singularly unfortunate in your friends, Mr. Bryan. Here is Mr. Mack, your intimate friend, stated as a member of your cabinet in the clouds, who publicly admits that he is a falsifier. The only question, therefore, is not whether Mr. Mack lied, but when he lied.

Hisgen then goes on to review the Hisgen charges and declares that the Oklahoma governor withdrew his suit against his accuser through fear.

He classes Mack and Haskell as "bad eggs out of the same bad basket" and closes by advising Bryan that he is "unfortunate in his choice of friends."


In naming them he refers to Senator Bailey, Senator McLawrin, Roger Sullivan, Thomas Taggart and John W. Kern.

Bryan has denied emphatically that such a fund ever existed or that any such donation was ever made. His denial has been corroborated and supported by statements from National Chairman Norman H. Mack and various other Democratic leaders.
