OREGONIAN REFUSES TO CORRECT MISSTATEMENT

Tariff Plank of the Republican Party Falsely Ascribed to William J. Bryan—Republican Organ Scores Democratic Leader for What Did Not Say.

Herewith The Journal republishes the Oregonian's editorial of September 14, in which it falsely ascribed to William J. Bryan the tariff plank of the Republican platform. On the same day George H. Thomas, chairman of the Democratic County Central committee, wrote to the editor of the Oregonian, calling attention to the fact that the language which that paper had quoted and ascribed as Bryan's was not his, but was the exact language of the Republican platform. The Oregonian refused to publish the letter. The Journal has called attention repeatedly to this gross misrepresentation on the part of the Oregonian and has demanded a correction. The demand has been ignored although the tariff issue is one of the most important of the campaign, and though thou-

well as of differences to be adjusted. Men never will agree upon them. They will agree upon the loose statement, as presented by Mr. Bryan, but never upon the details in working it out. They can't. It is not a problem of mathematics. The human spirit controls it all. Agree on the Bryan statement, yet you are no nearer the solution than you were before. The formula offers no sure values or definite qualities. For in the same condition and under the same laws, will fail. Then the best talents, the highest powers, the greatest ability will win out. Bryan's suggestion is no real departure from the policy of the protectionists. It is but a difference in principle from that of Cannon, Payne and Dalmat, but keeping open a way to the splitting of hairs on schedules on wages in this industry and that on reasonable or unreasonable profits.
