

ROOSEVELT WILL AT EUGENE

Eugene, Oct. 24.—Richard Pearson Hobson spoke in Junction yesterday afternoon to the largest political meeting held in Junction by either party during this campaign. He talked over two hours, and was well received. After the meeting he was hurried into Eugene in an automobile with J. M. Travis, chairman of the County Democratic Central committee, and Mayor Matlock, of Eugene. Long before eight o'clock, the hour set for the Hobson meeting in Eugene the courthouse was packed with the largest crowd that has assembled at a political meeting in Eugene since Mr. Bryan came through here in 1896, and hundreds were turned away for want of room. Although many in the audience were at the university and at the opera house, it seemed that all Eugene had turned out to see Hobson. Mr. Hobson spoke in the following manner:

"An American should resist instantly any attempt, direct or indirect, to influence by coercion or intimidation the free exercise of his franchise. All Americans should resent threats on the part of the employers to influence the votes of their employes. Every citizen, direct or indirect, to influence votes by threats of closing down mills, reducing hours of work, or reducing wages, and to block the free exercise of the franchise, is a traitor to the nation. The election, like the argument that property will vanish in a moment, is a dangerous delusion. It is a European, and not an American, who realizes that an untrammelled ballot is the chief difference between a free and a slave state. It is a European, and not an American, who holds up his head and looks the world in the face, realizing that he is a free man in a free state."

"It is a most dangerous thing for the secretary of state and the president of the United States to advocate, the extension of the powers of the federal government through interpretation and construction, instead of through amendment of the constitution. Action that would be more dangerous because it is not subject to the checks and balances that would be the constraining and interpreting."

"The constitution provides for three coordinate branches of government, legislative to make the laws, judicial to interpret them, and executive to enforce them. In its own clearly defined sphere, all our wise statesmen have warned against the grave danger of the encroachment of one branch upon the domain of the others. In time of war the danger comes from the legislative branch, which has a tendency to encroach upon the other two. In time of peace the danger is from the executive encroaching upon the other two, and from the judicial, encroaching upon the legislative."

"There have been during the present administration, more than in any other administration since the executive encroachment and usurpation, but the most dangerous usurpation has been that of the judiciary, in injunction cases, until we have come to the point of saying that we are getting to a government by injunction."

"It is not necessary to discuss the technicalities of this question, with which effort is being made to hide the great question, itself. It is known of all men that there has been exercised abusive extension of injunction, and that the beginnings of government by injunction branch upon the domain of the others. In time of war the danger comes from the legislative branch, which has a tendency to encroach upon the other two. WEATHER REPORT

The high pressure area over the north Pacific states has decreased slightly. A severe storm is noted this morning over the middle Mississippi valley. It has caused general rains in the Mississippi and Ohio valleys and the lake region, and heavy snow in the lower Missouri valley. Light rain has fallen in the Pacific states, but elsewhere in the Rocky mountain and Pacific states fair weather prevails, with temperatures slightly below normal.

The indications are for fair weather in this district tonight, except along the Oregon and north Oregon coasts, where rain will occur. Sunday fair weather will continue in southern Oregon, eastern Washington, Idaho, but cloudiness will increase elsewhere and probably be followed by rain.
