LEADS EXHIBIT TO THE STATE

Oregon will display part of the wonderful forestry exhibit now in the big log cabin on the Lewis and Clark fair grounds at the A.-Y.-P. fair in Seattle next year. The city park board instructed its clerk yesterday afternoon to inform Secretary of State Benson that the board would allow the state to use the exhibits in the forestry building. The board also decided to purchase a playground for the children of Sellwood. This playground consists of a block of land at East Twenty-third and Clatsop streets and will cost the city \$850. The total expense of making a suitable recreation lot will be \$160 and all will be covered by a special appropriation of \$1,000. After a long discussion the request of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company to be allowed to prune trees along its lines was referred to the city attorney.

ARCHITECTS SUE SCHOOL BOARD

Kable & Kable yesterday afternoon filed suit against school district No. 1 for \$12,500 damages because the firm's plans for the proposed new Albina high school were not accepted by the school board. The plaintiffs, who are represented by Bernstein & Cohen and M. L. Pipes, allege in their complaint that the board did not consider their plans or the report of Architect Somervell whom they had made a jury to decide as the best plans submitted. Kable & Kable claim that their plans were the only ones that complied with the specifications laid down by the board and that Somervell so decided. They say the board rejected their plans and the report with the deliberate purpose of favoring other architects. The plaintiffs claim damages on account of the time and labor spent in preparing the plans.

AUTHORIZES BIDS ON GARBAGE BURNING

An ordinance framed by Deputy City Attorney Grant, authorizing the calling of bids for the operation of a garbage cremation system, was favorably recommended to the council by the health and police committee yesterday afternoon. The attempt of the Sanitary Garbage company to get a franchise for 25 years was defeated. The advertisement will be for estimates on three garbage crematories, one on the east side in the business district and two on the west side. Of the latter two, one will be operated for the business portion of the city and the other for the residence district.

GOES TO PROBE BANK WRECK AT LA GRANDE

National Bank Examiner Wilson was in Portland yesterday on his way to La Grande, where he is to make an investigation of the affairs of the Farmers & Traders National bank, which closed its doors last week as the result of forgeries by Jefferson W. Scriber, the cashier. A part of Mr. Wilson's duties is to look into banks which have failed and collect evidence which is to be used by the government should the case be taken into the courts in this particular case. Scriber already has been charged with embezzlement of more than \$17,000.

PENINSULAR PEOPLE WORK FOR FESTIVAL

One hundred new members were added to the roll of the Peninsular Rose Festival association at a meeting held for that purpose in Peninsular Thursday night. The big hall was crowded. The work of ordering and planting rose bushes will now be begun in earnest and plans for the coming festival made.

New Lumber Tariff. Copies of the new lumber tariff have been received by Portland railroads and lumber shippers. It is a massive affair and contains more than 10,000 rates. The tariff is issued by the agent of the Transcontinental Freight bureau as agent of all the transcontinental lines. It is possible to look it up and turn at once to any tariff from any point on the lines to any other point west of and including Indiana and Louisiana.

REFERS MATTER TO THE COUNCIL

Application of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company for a street car line franchise on Patton avenue, was referred to the council without recommendation, on motion of Chairman Rushlight. Most of the property owners on the avenue do not want tracks laid on this thoroughfare, but there are a few that do. Among the latter is Francis I. McKenna. The objection to Patton avenue being used as a street car route is that it is one of the streets it is contemplated to include in the great boulevard system planned by the city. The committee decided that some route should be given the railway company immediately in order that the corporation might begin construction on its line to the packing house district on the peninsula.

SERVIANS WILL HOLD MEETING OF PROTEST

The Servians of Portland, of whom there are several hundred, have called a meeting for next Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Upchurch hall, Seventeenth and Marshall streets, to draft a protest against the annexation by Austria of Bosnia and Herzegovina. The recent announcement by Austria that hereafter she would consider Bosnia and Herzegovina as a part of her possessions, has greatly excited not only the people of Servia, but also the expatriated Servians. There are thousands of them in the United States, many having located in Portland and San Francisco, and in all cities where there are numbers of them, they have called meetings of protest similar to the one to be held here next Sunday. The objects of the meeting are, not only to protest formally against the seizure of the Servian provinces, but to adopt some plan of raising money and men to aid their country in the war, which they fully expect Servia will have to wage against her big neighbor.

CHARGE CLERK WITH THEFT

Charles Dent, a young man well known about town, and until recently employed as a salesman by Woodard, Clarke & Co., was arrested on a charge of embezzlement yesterday and lodged in the county jail, his bond being fixed at \$1,000. He is charged in the complaint sworn out by Dent's former employer the young man kept \$100 out of the returns of his sales and converted the money to his own use. He was arrested at the Colonial hotel at Tenth and Morrison streets by Constable Wagner.

MRS. WELTER IS DENIED DIVORCE

Deciding that her charges of drunkenness and cruelty were not sustained by the evidence, Judge Cleland in the circuit court yesterday refused to grant Elizabeth Welter a divorce from J. N. Welton. The case was tried several weeks ago. Three mechanics' lien cases were decided by Judge Cleland on their merits in that of Jack Rankin against R. A. Frodoff, the court rejected the theory of the defense that a partnership existed and held that the plaintiff and his brother, both of whom are dumb, were working for themselves. He allowed them \$6 per day for plastering and \$2 for unskilled labor. In the case of W. G. Robb against Daisy W. Flippen the court ruled that

the Oregon Paint & Varnish company cannot maintain its cross suit and ordered a dismissal as to G. A. Brodie. In the other case of Mechanics' lien, that of William A. Adams against Wil-

Han F. Mackenzie, the court ruled that the terms of the contract were not changed and that there has been no substantial performance of the contract, dismissing both the complaint and the

counter claim. Judge Cleland denied a motion for new trial in the case of O. G. Emig against John F. Sharkey, in which it was claimed that the court erred in re-

fusing certain evidence. It appears that before suit was begun on the obligation the defendant tendered all that was due and this was held sufficient to discharge the defendant of payment.
