

GIRL IDENTIFIES SECOND NEGRO

Judge's Ruse May Result in Clearing Man Accused of Heinous Crime.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 Westminster, B. C., Oct. 24.—A sensational turn in the trial growing out of the murder of Mrs. Mary Morrison, who was killed at Hazelmore last spring, was developed today when Mary Morrison, the 11-year-old daughter of the dead woman, identified as the murderer a strange negro who was placed in the prisoner's box, instead of Jim Jenkins, colored, whom she had previously pointed out as the guilty man.
 When court convened this afternoon, a negro who had never been seen by the girl before sat in the prisoner's box under orders from the presiding judge. Asked if the negro before her was the guilty man, Mary declared positively that he was. She was told to advance and scrutinize him closer. As she was obeying instruction, she started back, screaming that there was no question about him being the guilty man. Inasmuch as the same girl had positively identified Jenkins, who was in his cell during the dramatic scene in court, as the murderer of her mother, the prosecution has little hope now of convicting Jenkins.
 Mary was with her mother when a colored man killed her.

VON BUELOW AND ISWOLSKY MEET

Russian Minister and German Chancellor Discuss Balkans Conference.

 Berlin, Oct. 24.—The preliminary negotiations between Germany and Russia relative to the proposed conference between the European powers upon a readjustment of the Balkan situation began today. Foreign Minister M. Iswolsky, on behalf of the czar's government, and Prince Von Buelow were in conference throughout the entire day.
 It is learned that an effort will probably be made to draw Germany, Russia, France and England into an agreement regarding the Balkan conference. It is known that Russia, England and France have practically agreed to a program that is distasteful to Germany. That the fate of the general conference rests on the outcome of today's meeting of the diplomats is generally conceded.
 An intimation was current today that Emperor William would take part in the present conference.
 German diplomats have charged unofficially that England in reality opposes the conference of the powers and is urging Turkey to stand out against certain proposals that are programmed to come up for discussion and revision. The rumor that Iswolsky was to be recalled because of inefficiency is denied and his continued activity in the negotiations apparently supports the denial.

FAVORS NAVY YARD AT MARE ISLAND

 Mare Island Navy Yard, Cal., Oct. 24.—Rear Admiral Richard C. Holliday, chief of the bureau of yards and docks of the United States navy, left here today for Washington, after having completed an official inspection of the navy yard. From a statement made by Admiral Holliday before he left, it is believed that he will ask congress for a large appropriation for the development of the navy yard when the session begins this winter.
 Admiral Holliday spoke in favor of the development of the navy yard here to its highest efficiency and declared in favor of developing the two navy yards on the coast before any more are constructed.
 He denied that he had ever given out any statement that could be construed to mean that he favored the establishment of another navy yard in San Francisco bay and said that he did not believe that the navy department was considering such a move. Rear Admiral Holliday was formerly stationed at Mare Island and it is thought here that he will oppose any movement to displace the navy yard here with another near San Francisco.

MAN 85 YEARS OLD WANDERS IN HILLS

 Santa Monica, Cal., Oct. 24.—A searching party is trying to find Lewis P. Clark, 85 years old, who has been missing from the home of his daughter, Mrs. John McKasick, for more than 26 hours. It is feared he has strayed into the canyons leading into the Santa Monica mountains, far from human habitation, and that exposure and fatigue may prove fatal. When he started out yesterday morning his wife and daughter followed him four blocks, pleading with him to return. Last night and today a search was made in the foothills but no trace of the aged wanderer could be found.
 Clark is a veteran of the Mexican war and a pioneer of California, having come across the plains in 1850.

6,421 VOTERS HAVE REGISTERED IN LANE

 Eugene, Or., Oct. 24.—County Clerk Lee has footed up the number of voters registered during the thirty days previous to last Tuesday. Six hundred and twelve have placed their names on the register in that time. Of these 373 are Republicans, 187 Democrats and the remainder are scattering. A total of 6,421 names are on the registration books for the year. Of these 2,978 are Republicans, 1,214 are Democrats, 118 are Prohibitionists, 253 are Socialists, 7 are Populists, 157 are Independents, 112 refused to give their politics and 81 have no party.
