PRESENTS PORTRAIT OF JUDGE BELLINGER



A new portrait of the late United States Judge C. B. Bellinger, painted by R. LeBarre Goodwin for the State Bar association, has been hung in the federal court room, in the post-office building. The painting is life size and occupies a prominent position in the court room, hanging just back of the jury box and to the right of the bench where Judge Charles E. Wolverton presides. There have been but three United States district judges for Oregon—Judge Matthew P. Deady, Judge Bellinger and Judge Wolverton. Judge Deady was the first federal district judge for Oregon and was appointed by President James K. Polk. Judge Deady presided for many years, and when well advanced in years was retired. Judge Bellinger succeeded him. A large painting of Judge Deady has been hanging in the federal court room for years, having been presented by the State Bar association. It hangs directly over the bench.

The grapes come from Lewiston, Idaho, and are exhibited by the Lewiston Land & Water company. In the display are several different varieties, Malaga, Ramona, Emperor, Cornhorns, Flame Tokays and Muscats occupying the most prominent places. Lewiston grapes have won prizes over California grapes in three recent world's fairs, and captured eighteenth prize among 800 of the world's competitors. There are forty different varieties of grapes raised in Lewiston. Most of them are European varieties.
