WOMAN RALLIES DEMAND THAT COUNTY BUILDING BE MOVED

Every Stump Speaker of Both Parties Will Be Kept Busy in the City and in County Until the Night Before Election.

East Side Push Clubs Think County Building Is Now on Wrong Side of Willamette River—Will Discuss Matter at Meeting.

The close of the campaign is to witness renewed activity in Oregon on the part of both Democrats and Republicans. Every available speaker in both camps will be kept busy up to and including next Monday night, when the war horses will rest from their labors and allow the voters to do the real work. The big meeting of this week will be the Democratic rally at the Armory next Saturday night, at which Senator John M. Gentry will be the principal speaker. It is expected that this, which will be the last big rally of the campaign, will draw a crowd which will fill the building. Mayor Harry Lane will preside and it is probable that he will make an address. There will be an address by Senator Gentry. There will be Democratic meetings at various places in the city and county on all the other nights of the week. Tomorrow night E. S. J. McCallister will speak at Jones hall, Front and Gibbs streets. Thursday night there will be a meeting of Odd Fellows hall, Grand avenue and East Pine street. The speakers have not yet been selected. There will also be a meeting Thursday night at Ladd hall, Seventeenth and Thurman streets, at which Colonel Robert A. Miller will address the voters. Another meeting will be held the same night at Woodmen hall, Mount Tabor. The speakers have not yet been chosen. Friday night there will be a rally at Lenta and another at Gresham. Colonel Robert A. Miller and others will address the latter. Saturday night, in addition to the big rally at the Armory, there will be a meeting at Bridal Veil and another in West Portland. M. A. Miller and E. S. J. McCallister will speak at Corvallis Thursday evening at Haines Friday evening and at Newberg Monday evening. M. A. Miller and Colonel M. E. Gibson will address the voters at Sheridan Saturday night. Monday evening there will be a Democratic rally at The Dalles, at which Judge O'Day will be the principal speaker.

A meeting of the presidents of all the east side push clubs is to be held tonight in the Sargent hotel, Grand avenue and Hawthorne avenue, for the purpose of discussing several questions regarded as very important by the east side business men. The members of the United club are discussing the prospects for bringing the new courthouse, whenever it is built, to the east side. They hold that the east side is the only logical place for the courthouse. They have prepared themselves for perhaps every argument that will be put up against an east side courthouse. The greater population by far is on the east side, they say. This is admitted by everybody, so they use this as their principal argument. They contend that where one lawyer might be inconvenienced by being compelled to go from his west side office to an east side courthouse, many witnesses are now inconvenienced by being obliged to go from their east side homes and places of business to a west side courthouse. It is argued, also, that farmers who come to town are greatly inconvenienced by being obliged to cross the river to go to the courthouse. The west side element answers this by saying that the farmer must come to the west side anyway to go to the commission houses, but the east side comes back with the argument that the wholesale houses are gradually coming to the east side, and that several are already located there. There are many other arguments and equally as many answers. However, the matter is to be taken up and a decision by the members of the club is expected tonight.

ROBBERS SHOOT A SALOON MAN

John Brugger Is Twice Wounded in Battle With Thugs.

While John Brugger, proprietor of the Teutonia saloon, 204 Taylor street near Front, was talking to his wife over the telephone at 11:30 last night, two men wearing red masks entered the saloon and ordered him to throw up his hands.

Believing two friends were trying to play a joke on him, Brugger refused to do anything of the kind. Thereupon one of the visitors stepped up on the bar and leaning over fired a shot from his revolver. The bullet entered Brugger's thigh. The man who had fired at once backed out of the saloon. Brugger seized a beer bottle and made for the other intruder. This man fired two shots at him. One bullet missed his head by an inch, but the other lodged in his left leg.

The saloonkeeper was game to the last, and as this last assailant retreated also, he limped to the sidewalk in pursuit. By this time the thugs had decided to get out of the neighborhood and taking to their heels they dashed south on Front street. Brugger, standing at the corner, soon lost sight of them.

ORPHEUM BILL A CARE CHASER

With the most evenly balanced bill of the season the Orpheum opened a new week of vaudeville last night. Not since the house opened, in the opinion of many regular patrons, have so many really first class turns been included in one program. There is not a dull moment from the time Miss Ethel MacDonough, the fascinating girl drummer, appears with a flash of smiles and dainty red silk hose, until pretty little Bird Millman, the aerial dancing wonder, completes her final fancy step on the tight wire.

The bill is strong in singing and dancing, especially in character. Fred Warren and Al Blanchard, in a black and white song and dance turn, really are extraordinarily funny, and Frank and Joe Wilson, who just as many laughs in their German comedy act, "In a Padded Cell." If you would like to hear two of three popular songs murdered in the choicest of high school German go by all means and hear these two teams.

May and Flora Hengler, whose singing and dancing has charmed critical audiences of two hemispheres, fulfill all expectations.

Lieutenant-Governor Chanler, Democratic candidate for governor of New York, was also on the stand. All these distinguished Democrats made addresses.

Labor Issues Emphasized. The candidate emphasized the issues raised by labor in this campaign. He declared that Gompers had never criticized the courts more severely than Roosevelt himself had. He charged that the president was now issuing a daily bulletin assuring the people that Mr. Taft was a friend of labor. "My friends," he said, "there is a certain mutuality about friendship; both sides have to be consulted and Mr. Roosevelt consults only one side when he discusses Mr. Taft as the friend of labor. I care not what he may say about Mr. Taft's friendship for labor. Mr. Taft's record shows that he is not in sympathy with those who toil in this country."

Bryan quoted Taft's decision in the case of Thomas vs. the Cincinnati, New Orleans & Texas Pacific Railway company, authorizing the receiver to make a cut of 10 per cent in the wages of employees and denying their right to appeal.

He said that in the west Taft was running on his amendments to the Chicago platform, while in the east he was running on the official platform.

The "Conscience" Issue. In conclusion Bryan spoke solemnly of the conscience factor in the campaign. He said: "I have watched the progress of this campaign. I want now, as the campaign is drawing to a close, to leave with you some thoughts I believe worthy of your consideration before you vote. I charge that the Republican leaders no longer lead the Republican voters. I believe that our party has been betrayed by the Republican platform."

"The Republican party has claimed to be the party of morality. It has claimed to express the conscience of the nation. I charge that today it misrepresents the general sentiment of the country and betrays the conscience of the American people."

"There is a great question of conscience before the American people. It is honesty in politics. You cannot have honest government without honest principles, and the Democratic party is insuring a new era in American politics. The investigations, the disclosures, the revelations have shown what enormous campaign funds have been secretly collected and corruptly used, and an awakened people demanded that that should stop, but the Republican senate and house refused to listen to the demand and a Republican national convention rejected the plank that was aimed at honesty in politics. "Our committee applied the doctrine of the platform to the present campaign and has done what no national committee ever did before—it has taken the people into its confidence and laid bare the sources of its campaign contributions. The Republican committee refused to do this."

PENNSY TO USE 5,000 IDLE CARS

Harrisburg, Pa., Oct. 27.—The Pennsylvania railroad is clearing the Petersburg branch, of the middle division, of all the freight cars which have been stored there since last winter, numbering about 5,000.
