County Bar Association Is tings to be held during the last Unanimous in Favor of Increase.

That Multnomah county needs six Mississippi avenue and Shaver street circuit judges instead of four is the tonight under the auspices of the Re- unanimous opinion of the Multnomah house last night. It was decided to appoint a committee of five to cenfer with the members of the Multnomah delegation in the legislature and ask their united support for a bill to give the county two additional judges. The association decided to take up the movement independent of any other interest, and to treat it as strictly a local affair. For this reason a suggestion that the State Bar association be invited to indores the plan was rejected.

A. E. Clark declared that the most effective means of promoting the object sought will be to make a comparison of the work of the courts here with the duties performed in other cities of the Pacific coast. For instance, Seattle has six judges at all times, and a seventh about half the time. Statistics along this line will be gathered by a committee of five authorized last night.

Dan J. Malarkey was the mover of the resolution in favor of increasing the number of judges. He pointed out that unless some relief is granted at the next session of the legislature nothing can be done until 1911. He said that the matter does not need argument among the lawyers, who know the present congested condition of the court calendar, with cases already set as far ahead as next March, and a certainty that the situation will grow worse from month to month.

Alexander Bernstein said it might be well to invite the four circuit judges to state the need for additional judges, but the majority of the attorneys thought otherwise. They said that the judges might have a feeling of delicacy in discussing the matter in that way, and it might be argued by some that the judges should not take up the advocacy of the movement.
