

DYNAMITE TOO CARELESSLY HANDLED

Railroad Commission Will Bring Small Lines in Oregon to Book—Must Act Inasmuch as Federal Law Does Not Apply.

Oregon railroads, particularly the smaller lines, are to come in for rigid inspection on the part of the state railroad commission because of the manner in which they handle dynamite and other high explosives.

Although Oregon has no state law regarding the transportation of explosives, the railroad commission will probably notify all the railroads in the state of the danger attendant upon their careless handling and will ask them to follow the interstate instructions for shipment of explosives.

When shipments are made in less than carload lots the interstate law says that the boxes shall be marked that they shall be firmly fastened in place with braces and cleats, and that scumming shall be placed over and around them to keep them from shifting and to keep other freight from falling on them.

"Transportation of explosives was one of the important subjects taken up at the meeting of the National Association of Railroad Commissioners, said C. B. Atchison, of the state railroad commission this morning.

"In my opinion the small roads are the worst offenders, because the larger lines have to comply with the interstate regulations."

While Mr. Atchison was in the east he saw President Roosevelt, who recalled with pleasure his visit to the Smithsonian, Kelly and Gilbert, the Oregon athletes.

The convention reported as in favor of an amendment to the interstate commission act allowing railroad commissions to suspend advances in railroad rates until the commissions had had opportunity to look into the justice of the increase.

BRYAN ATTACKS REPUBLICAN REFORM

(United Press Leased Wire.) Napoleon, Ohio, Oct. 30.—In his speech here today, Bryan attacked the Republican party's attitude on tariff reform, attacking it as a league with the trusts. He said he had read the dispatch from New York in which Rockefeller had been quoted as advocating the election of Taft and declared his opposition to the tariff and the Republican party in return for promises of immunity from prosecution in the event that Taft was elected.

(Continued from Page One.) turn to prosperity by advocating measures subversive of industrial progress.

"The question of candidates seems to me peculiarly a personal one in this campaign, because the leading orators on both sides have not succeeded in drawing party lines, as based on platforms, with any clearness. I do, however, support the general Republican position on the tariff and the currency. I have always been a Republican.

"I feel the more impelled to answer this question because it cannot be said in the present campaign that in any way whatever favored the special interest to which my life has been devoted. That, however, does not excuse me from publishing my opinion and doing what I consider my duty as a citizen."

"Rockefeller is for Taft."

Mr. Bryan was at Napoleon, Ohio, today showing the Mack message and the Rockefeller statement. To a correspondent Mr. Bryan said:

"Rockefeller is for Taft because Taft is for the trusts. Taft, during many weeks of speaking has omitted any reference to the trusts. He has said, 'I see no wonder Rockefeller is for Taft. Rockefeller says the election of Taft would make for law and order. This is in order.'"

"If Rockefeller thought that Taft would enforce the law against the Standard Oil company and favor the enactment of more stringent laws that would operate against the Standard, as I do, he would be for Taft."

"He says that Taft's election will make for the stability of business. He means the trust business. He thinks Taft's election will enable the trusts to get a tighter strangle grasp on the throats of the people."

"I do not incline toward rash experiments. Taft favors any kind of experiments in the way of remedial legislation. The Democratic party, however, to be thankful to Rockefeller for tearing off the mask of the Republican campaign and revealing the duplicity that has characterized it."

Challenges Roosevelt. "I challenged President Roosevelt to name a single trust officer who was supporting me. He was unable to name an official and named a St. Louis attorney, who once represented the pretensions of a branch of the Standard Oil company. Roosevelt accepted that as proof that the Standard was supporting me."

"Now, John D. Rockefeller, head and chief of Standard Oil, openly supports Taft."

"If the Republicans were honest, they would announce that they have arranged with the trusts to finance the campaign and they have paid one of the highest prices for the trusts. This would release the voters from supporting the ticket."

"The party cannot serve two masters. The real master is now known."

At the Wieting opera house at Syracuse, N. Y., last night, Alton B. Parsons, in his highest terms, in the same speech severely criticizing Taft and Hughes.

"It gives me pleasure," he said, "to come here tonight, especially because I am permitted to advocate for a little time the cause of one who has a clean, soft character and exalted patriotism—the Democratic standard-bearer for the presidency."

HOW THE SITUATION LOOKS TO THE MAN WHOSE MONEY TALKS

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Oct. 30.—"Much talk and little money," apparently sums up the situation throughout the country today as to how the election will go.

Chicago reports that less than \$100 has been posted at the eight leading hotels. The prevailing odds are 3 to 1 that Bryan will carry the state and 4 to 1 is offered that Taft will win Chicago.

Denver correspondents say that even money is offered without takers. A few bets have been made there at 4 to 1 on Taft, and 5 to 1 that the Republicans will carry Indiana.

Philadelphia reports that there is practically no betting there. In Washington Republicans refuse to cover Bryan money at the prevailing odds of 4 to 1, with Taft the favorite.

BRYAN SENDS WORDS OF CHEER TO OREGON; TAFT LOSSES IN OHIO

By John E. Lathrop. Cincinnati, Ohio, Oct. 30.—Bryan while enroute to Toledo today said to me: "You may say to the Oregon people that I expect to be elected, carrying Ohio, Indiana, and New York. Practically all changes in these states this year are in our favor and victory is promised in a number of other states, as certain to carry Nebraska."

"Covering Ohio several days I risked railroad men practically sold for Bryan and other union labor men in large proportions are for him."

Tom L. Johnson said to The Journal: "This state will go for Bryan, who will be elected. We expect to carry Cuyahoga county and Cleveland by 25,000."

Everywhere I have been told that sums of money are being distributed from Taft headquarters at Columbus to local chairmen, but all the labor leaders assert that this will not affect the labor vote. The principal negro Republican leader in Cleveland admitted that the negroes were heavily for Bryan. He said he feared nearly 50 per cent of them were for Bryan, though he himself was for Taft.
