

JURY CONVICTS THREE OF FIVE Smith, Hedderly and Hynes Found Guilty of Land Frauds.

William H. Smith, Dr. A. H. Hedderly and Richard Hynes, found guilty yesterday by a federal jury on a charge of having conspired to defraud the government, are to ask for a new trial, and should this not be granted an appeal will be taken. Two of the five defendants, Lee R. Myers and Jeremiah Huntley, were yesterday found not guilty. The defendants were members of the Pacific Furniture & Lumber company, and were indicted together with many others. Two of the indicted ones have since died and another has never been apprehended. Four others pleaded guilty when the case was called for trial before Judge Wolverson in the United States district court two weeks ago. The government charged the defendants with forming a conspiracy to defraud the government out of 30,000 acres of timber lands in Curry county. The plan was to sell stock in the company and induce the investor to take up a timber claim, all expenses being paid by the company, which would eventually gain title to the land. Before being brought here for trial the defendant made a hard fight in the federal court at Los Angeles against removal to Oregon to stand trial. Most of the defendants live in Los Angeles, where the headquarters of the Pacific Furniture & Lumber company were located. Tracy C. Becker, special assistant to the attorney general, and John McCourt, United States district attorney, had charge of the prosecution for the government. The defense was represented by John Manning of Portland and Marcus C. McLamore of Los Angeles.

Gogorza Charms Large Audience of Music Lovers at the Heilig

It seems a pity that with such splendid operatic style Emilio de Gogorza should have resisted all inducements to enter the operatic field. And yet had he not refused a valuable singer would have been lost to the song recital field. Gogorza returned last night to the Heilig for his third concert before a Portland audience, and he added most substantially to the laurels he has earned on his former visits. The baritone came here first three seasons ago with Emma James and only a sense of courtesy kept him from outshining the diva, who was the "topliner" of that concert. The next season he came out on a tour of his own and gave a delightful recital which, with no pianist to break up the monotony, was listened to with rapt attention throughout. And again attention and interest never waned and had he been so inclined he could have remained there long after the last number was over. A fine intellect and an artistic appreciation are the qualities in Gogorza which force themselves on the public that hears him. Everything is sung with the acme of good taste. Whether it be a dramatic operatic aria, a pompous recitative, an impassioned love song, a rollicking mirth song or a thirty little ballad, it is sung with the same grace of expression and fidelity to the thought. His charming Handel number, typical of its composer, "Where'er you walk," was one of his first, and showed the extreme delicacy of his work. The "Epithete" on "Fairide" following was in direct contrast and gave him plenty of opportunity to turn on the power and roundness, sonorous and vibrant, but never deteriorating to the customary baritone howl. An exquisite "Feldensamkeit" he used his soft and high tones, and showed how he could sink his voice almost to a whisper and still retain the best of his singing quality. Tenderness is beautifully depicted by him, but no less well are his songs of anger sung. His Spanish group was to me the best of the evening's work, though he said afterward that much as he loves to sing the Spanish songs he feels handicapped because he knows so few know what he is singing about. His "Tours" number, "Mother o' mine," was greeted with the usual bated breath and sigh of pain, and the song was artistically done. The clamor for the encore to the well known number called out "Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes," that picturesque old English ballad that even baritone has sung since its revival by Blaphem. Homer's "Requiem" was good. "The Lark Now Leaves Its Wat'ry Nest" (Parker) was a repetition of one of his old successes, daintily done. The singer was called out repeatedly at the close of the program till he finally sang the bewitching "Largo al Factotum" from "Barbiere de Sevilla" (Rossini), which, if my memory serves me right, was one of his best numbers on his program two years ago. His singing of Alveres' beautiful "La Partida" in another encore was one of the rare bits of the evening and brought back his former triumph in that melodious song teeming with repressed feeling. But to enumerate his food numbers would be to name them all, and I have almost done that. Grieg's "Ich Lieb, Dich" was sung with powerful abandon and had to be repeated. Schumann's "Widmung" was delivered with fervor. And so on. But all that is really necessary to say is that Gogorza gave a program, and that means that he sang enough artistic recital was given, by a splendid virtuos baritone who has perfect control over his vocal organs and has brought his art to a fine polish, who sings with ease, brilliancy and intelligence, who brings his own sympathy with him and who sings be-
