

CONSERVATIVE REPUBLICAN RANKS OVERLOOK D'S WORDS Democracy vs. Plutocracy

Professional and Business Men Attest Their Confidence That Bryan's Election Will Mean the Resumption of Prosperity.

Chicago, Oct. 31.—The confidence which the professional and business world have in Mr. Bryan is expressed in numerous telegrams and letters which have come to the Democratic national committee on the eve of election.

Mr. Undermyer wires: "It is impossible to conceive how a legitimate business interest could be injured by Mr. Bryan's election. He has conducted the most dignified, conservative campaign that we have known in many years, and has advanced no policy which is not in the interest of honest enterprise. The business men of America are too intelligent to be deceived by the false cry that has been raised to prevent a much needed change from the administration under which we have suffered, and are suffering, from one of the most disastrous and commercial butchers in our history."

Mr. Belmont says: "In fear that an influential army of office-holders will be driven from office and power, the Republican managers and their commercial allies are at the last moment manifesting a clumsy maneuver to affect the time and ignore the administration, chiefly itself responsible for the present panic, should the defeat at the polls on Tuesday. The election of Mr. Bryan, with the senate against him, will restore the coordinate branches of the government, so greatly impaired by the erratic assumptions of authority in every direction by the present executive. TAFT RUSHES OUT A DENIAL

Gives Statement to Press Saying John D. Is Not Supporting Him

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 31.—"Rockefeller and the Standard Oil trust are not supporting me." This was the emphatic declaration of William H. Taft, Republican presidential candidate, before an enthusiastic audience of 6,000 in convention hall here last night. He said: "Now, Mr. Bryan is greatly troubled about my attitude toward the trusts and he has been made so by the announcement that Mr. Rockefeller is going to support me. Now, if the Standard Oil were anxious to bring about my election, it would be a simple matter to make a statement to the effect that it would be done would be to advertise its support of me. Therefore this publication which Mr. Bryan is now making so much of, it seems to me, has little significance in attempting to show that the Standard Oil or any other trust is supporting me in this campaign. That is not the way the support is tendered when it is desired to bring about an election."

KING GEORGE HAS RULED 45 YEARS

Athens, Oct. 31.—Many congratulations have been received by George I in recognition of the fact that today he rounded out 45 years as king of Greece. Born a Danish prince, son of the late King Christian IX, his majesty spent his early years in the Danish navy. The national assembly proclaimed him king of the Hellenes on March 20, 1863. He was then 17 years of age. He has been married since 1845. On October 20 of the same year he arrived in Athens, and on the following day he took the oath and ascended to the throne. Next to the emperor of Austria he is the oldest of the sovereigns of Europe. He enjoys excellent health, a fact which he ascribes to the regularity of his habits. He invariably arises early in the morning and works alone at 9:30. He takes tea and coffee with Queen Olga. He then receives his ministers and deputies and the persons entered upon the visiting book for a private audience. At 1:20 he breakfasts with all the royal family. After this repeat he again works for an hour or two. He then goes out for a drive or walk. Dinner is served at 8 o'clock, and the company comprises the members of the royal family, the members of the palace, and some private friends. The king goes out very rarely at night, unless to the theatre, or to the fetes given by the regent in honor of foreign powers. He prefers to pass the evening with his family.

DEMOCRATIC CHAIRMAN DECLARES TAFT GETS THE MONEY AND JOHN D. THE PROMISE OF BIG FINE'S REMISSION—THEN THERE'S ANDY.

Democratic Chairman Declares Taft Gets the Money and John D. the Promise of Big Fine's Remission—Then There's Andy.

New York, Oct. 31.—Charging that the Republican party has conspired with the corporate interests of the country to secure the election of Taft by a deal through which money was given for promises by Republican party managers that the \$3,000,000 fine will be "fixed" on Chairman Mack of the Democratic national committee today gave out a statement, commenting on John D. Rockefeller's support of Taft. He said: "The Standard Oil company has landed where everybody knew it would land. Mr. Rockefeller held back for a bargain and got what he wanted. The deal will be good for over 100,000 more votes for Mr. Bryan in the doubtful states, and over a million more for his special interests. The Republican party will get a good big 'can' through the deal. It can't specify the exact amount, but it is certain that when the bargain was struck both sides got what they were after. The Taft managers got the money and the Standard Oil got more. The \$3,000,000 fine will be fixed up some way and several other issues also. Mr. Bryan will get the money and the Standard Oil will get the fine. It is with Taft and not with Roosevelt."

Two Millions for Bribery. "I have it on good authority that the Republican national committee sent \$2,000,000 into the state of Indiana, and that has been sent into Ohio and a similar amount will be put into New York state. They have more than \$2,000,000. One million dollars is to conduct the campaign and the \$2,000,000 is for bribery. But I don't think the Republican party can buy Mr. Taft's election. You can't buy an election."

The Republicans are getting this money from the corporations. They have mortgaged the Republican party for money, the same as we have mortgaged the Democratic party, but I declined to do so. If I had done so, I know Bryan would have repudiated me. For this money the corporations are promised protection by tariff, and Mr. Taft is sympathetic to the promise. The scheme has been planned within the past two months and the Republican managers have now got the money.

Write House Statement Aboard. "The White House statement is its own answer. The bargain was made between Taft's managers and Rockefeller and concerns the possible future administration of the state of Indiana. The present administration has or has not done to the Standard Oil company."

PLAN TO END CAMPAIGN WITH GREAT PARADES

SAINTS' DAYS ON THE RIO GRANDE

San Antonio, Texas, Oct. 31.—Tomorrow and Monday, all saints and all souls' days, respectively, will be generally observed as holidays throughout southwest Texas, where the Mexican population is large. The observance is of a highly interesting character. In San Antonio, Brownsville, Eagle Pass and other cities and towns in the region, the Rio Grande people, the Mexican population have their own cemeteries. It is in these burial grounds that the unique ceremony of attending a supposed reception given by the dead is carried out on the morning of the day. Relatives and friends of the dead visit the cemeteries by hundreds, carrying with them flowers and wreaths. If the relatives of the dead are too poor to buy or cultivate flowers they plant oats or corn in the grave a few weeks before the holiday. The grain is then green and waving and answers the purpose of floral decoration.

NO WITNESS FEES FOR POLICEMEN Executive Board Will Require Officers Who Have Retained Money to Refund.

At the meeting of the city executive board held in the city hall yesterday afternoon, collection of witness fees by policemen was taken up and a decision was arrived at which is calculated to force the policemen to turn all witness fees into the fire and police fund. Police Commissioner T. G. Greene believes that the accepting of fees on the part of the policemen is not a graft. But, if the officer fails to turn the money over to the fund, it is a graft and is punishable. The board decided to compel all policemen who have accepted witness fees since last January, when the order against such action was made, to turn the full sum as shown on the records at the courthouse over to the fire and police benefit fund. In addition to paying in the witness fees, each policeman who has accepted fees and failed to turn them in will be fined \$5. In order that no families will suffer as a result of this order the board was lenient enough to allow the officers two months in which to come through. The money is to be taken from their regular salaries. In all future cases where an officer is called upon to testify the board has ordered the patrolman first to notify the captain of his relief and that the captain make note of it. Then the officer may demand his fees, but in all instances the policeman shall turn the money over to the fund or stand the consequences.

ALLEGED HOLDUP CHARGES ACCUSER

San Francisco, Oct. 31.—John P. Carr was found with a revolver in his hand early today by Sergeant Birdsall, standing over the prostrate body of Joseph Winberg, who lay in a pool of blood from bullet wounds in his chest and thigh. Carr told the police that Winberg had attempted to hold him up and that he fired in self-defense. The police took the precaution to arrest Carr and later today he was charged with assault with intent to commit murder, after Winberg had recovered consciousness and made a statement to the police. Winberg declares that he and two companions were passing on the street when Carr opened fire on them. Winberg asserts that they gave Carr no provocation. It is believed at the hospital that Winberg has a chance for recovery.
