Because he refused to submit to arrest by Patrolman R. H. Stahl, and started to run when the latter told him he was wanted as a suspect, J. V. De Laney was shot and killed by the officer early yesterday morning near the East Ankeny car barn on Twenty-eighth street.

De Laney boarded the last inbound Montavilla car at West avenue. The motorist now declares that when the man first started to step aboard the car he had the handkerchief over his face, but quickly pulled it down around his neck when the police officers on the rear platform.

Stahl says that when the man saw him he acted queerly and placed his hand in his pocket. Stahl thought this strange, as did also the conductor. When the car neared the barn Stahl stepped off the car as it stopped and saw the man standing on the ground. Stahl put his foot to the ground and saw the man put his hand on the fellow's shoulder and said, "Young man, I want you."

"No, you don't," replied De Laney, trying to pull away. The officer reached for the man's feet and discovered a pistol. The officer says that he was prevented. The officer ordered De Laney to throw up his hands, but the man broke away and started to run.

Stahl ordered him to halt and fired at him, but did not hit him. The man kept on toward the corner and Stahl fired another shot or two into the darkness in the direction of the running man.

Stahl at once hid behind a telephone pole and called out to the man to ask if he had been hit. De Laney said he had and asked for a doctor. After ascertaining that the wounded man had thrown away his gun, the officer came out from his cover and sent for a physician, who, however, did not arrive until the ambulance came.

The man told the men from the car barn who surrounded him that his name was J. V. De Laney, and that he had a wife in Tacoma. He said he had a number of papers, including a watch, a number of "avers" and \$16 in cash. He also showed him to be a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen in good standing.

Never Occupied Room. One of the papers bore the address 410 East Everett street, where it was later learned from Mrs. Horton, who lives there, that the man had rented a room from her Friday, but had not been there since that time.

Search at the scene of the shooting resulted in the finding of a .32-caliber revolver and a .38 Smith and Wesson. When the ambulance arrived the wounded man was placed in it, but died before the hospital was reached. The police are convinced that De Laney boarded the car with the intention of holding up the conductor. But he changed his mind when he saw Officer Stahl. It is thought that he may have been responsible for some of the holdups that have occurred recently.

An attempt has been made to connect him with the murder of Harry T. Campbell, a jewelry store manager, but there is nothing to indicate that he had anything to do with that crime.

De Laney's wife has been sent for and is expected to arrive from Tacoma today. An inquest will be held over the body of the man this afternoon at the Grismacher exonerates Officer Stahl from any blame in connection with the shooting.

DISAPPEARS FROM EAST SIDE HOME. Samuel Esteb, a building contractor, living at Reservoir Park on the Mount Scott line, disappeared from his home Saturday, and today efforts are being made by his wife and his father, a former resident of Heppner, to find him.

Esteb is known to have had over \$75 in cash on his person when he disappeared. It is understood that he also drew \$200 from a bank Saturday in order to pay several bills. In addition to these sums he had several hundred dollars in checks when last seen.

As Esteb was not known to drink even moderately no explanation can be given for his disappearance. The attention of the police was called to the case yesterday, and this morning his father visited the police station. Esteb is 35 years old and a strong, muscular man. Despite this fact, however, his father fears harm has come to him on account of the money he carried.

URGES ANNEXATION FOR MOUNT SCOTT. Portland, Nov. 2.—To the Editor of The Journal—Will you kindly allow me space in your paper to say a few words regarding annexation of the Mount Scott district, which seems to be opposed by a few, some of whom are not taxpayers in the district and have political reasons only for so doing.

A few days ago there appeared an article in an evening paper referring to the conditions on the peninsula, which if investigated in a reasonable way, will be found to be quite unreasonable, as I am informed that the peninsula is well cared for, where there is population enough to demand it. It is absurd to think that the city is going to install a fire engine or electric lights in the swamps or woods where nobody lives.

As to the Mount Scott district we have no lights, no fire protection, no police protection, insufficient water supply, high rates of fire insurance and an excellent chance for the streetcar company to raise the fare to 10 cents if we stay out of the city.
