

NEW MISTRESS OF WHITE HOUSE
WOMAN OF MANY GOOD QUALITIES

MRS. W. H. TAFT'S
CHARMING WAYS

Wife of President-Elect Described as Cultured and Refined.

No woman was ever called upon to fill the difficult and exacting position of mistress of the White House who was better prepared and equipped for her task than is Mrs. Helen H. Taft, the wife of President-elect Taft. She is a woman of culture and refinement and of many accomplishments, possesses unusual tact, social finish and, above all, a large measure of sound, common sense.

Very Attractive. Personally, Mrs. Taft is quite as attractive as she is from an intellectual point of view. She is fair, slender and girlish looking and no one would suspect from her appearance that she has a son old enough to be in college. She is frank and vivacious, unpretentious, and yet possessed of marked dignity of bearing and the self-poise so necessary to a woman in an exalted position.

The new mistress of the White House was Miss Helen Herron, daughter of the law partner of the late President Hayes, when she married William H. Taft in Cincinnati in 1888. She was a bright and talented girl with a passion for music. In addition to a good education, she received an excellent training in music and through all her life music has ever been her favorite recreation.

Her Place in Society. Although, probably, better equipped for a high social position than most women holding important positions in American society, Mrs. Taft is by no means a typical "society woman." Ever since her husband entered official life in Washington and ever before that, when he was still holding a judgeship in Ohio, Mrs. Taft has made it her study and aim to fill to the best of her ability the position in society to which she was entitled by virtue of her husband's official rank. Her natural talent and the intellectual training of her girlhood days made the task easier for her and her inborn tact helped her to avoid the pitfalls so disastrous to inexperienced and but indifferently equipped women in official society.

Nowhere is the new mistress of the White House seen to greater advantage than in her home circle, the supreme test for the sterling qualities of any woman, no matter what her position in society. She is devoted to her husband and her children, takes interest in everything pertaining to her domestic establishment and is considered a model housekeeper. She does not consider it below her dignity to attend to her household duties and devote great personal care to the proper conduct of her domestic establishment. No woman in Washington society ever better than Mrs. Taft how to add a wholesome and refreshing domestic charm to her social entertainments. No woman in Washington society ever better than Mrs. Taft as the hostess makes all her guests feel that they are received at her home, not in a hotel parlor or a public hall. She knows better than most women the secret of making her guests feel at ease, without vulgarizing the tone dominant of her hospitable board.

Accomplished Musician. Of her family and her own affairs Mrs. Taft speaks with well-bred discretion and sparingly, while she shows remarkable skill and tact in drawing out her visitors by manifesting sympathetic interest in their affairs. Her home, wherever she may be, is always filled with that intangible charm which springs from the intellectual, artistic refinement and exquisite artistic taste of the hostess. Mrs. Taft, like her daughter Helen, now studying at Bryn Mawr, is an Episcopalian, but she is broad enough not to allow religious differences of a serious nature to arise between her and her husband, who belongs to the Unitarian church, although he frequently attends services at the Episcopal church with his wife.

THINKS ORIENT
POOR MARKET

Tacoma Editor Says Asiatics Eventually Will Be the Only Competitors.

Frank B. Cole, editor of the West Coast Lumberman of Tacoma, who recently returned from a trip to the orient, upon his return delivered a lecture before the Tacoma chamber of commerce, in which he dealt extensively with the possibilities of the development of American trade in China and Japan. Mr. Cole also told many interesting facts concerning the customs of the Chinese and kindred races and made valuable observations as to the commercial development in the Hawaiian islands.

In part, Mr. Cole said: "A traveler usually forms quick conclusions. This seems to be an almost universal weakness of those who visit strange lands. Doubtless many travelers wish they had seen more and talked less. A well known Indiana senator no doubt would be happy if he had written of Russia's advance after, instead of before, the war. As I will probably be dead and my wife married again before my statements can be disproved, I feel safe in expressing an opinion and even venturing into prophecy. I am satisfied that the orient, in so far as we or our children are interested, will be more of a competitor than a customer. Beyond that period, let some unborn member of the chamber of commerce prophesy.

"China and Japan are the two nations that, in the popular concept, are to be great customers of our goods. Our ships will be going to and fro freighted with our productions. From all I could learn and see, these hopes and dreams are not well founded. On the trip I sailed to China on about 3,000 tons of freight were carried to Japan and India, but on return voyage the freight brought back about 14,000 tons. This was an exceptionally large returning load, but light cargoes to the orient are so unusual an occurrence.

Natives Do Not Buy. "The natives of those lands are not customers to any great extent of the productions of our country. It is the Europeans and the Americans living in those lands who demand the goods we manufacture. Some day the long heralded awakening of the orient may come, but with the awakening will come the skill to cater to new-born needs.

"Every ship that comes from the orient brings to this country goods manufactured in the few flour mills in the orient. There is practically no demand for it in that country, as cattle and horses are seldom seen. In Shanghai a great flouring mill stands idle. It was built at a cost of \$100,000. Its promoter committed suicide because of the failure to make this plant a success.

"Manchuria's wheat fields this year are giving an output of 40,000,000 bushels, while there will be an increase in its acreage for next year and then the next year. It is only a question of a few years when the flour of Puget sound will not be wanted on the other side of the water.

Under Jumble of Indiana Results the Icy One Lies Buried.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 4.—The wreck of the Fairbanks political machine in Indiana, leaving Senator Beveridge as the powerful factor in the state, is the forecast from the defeat of the Fairbanks men and the utter rout of his organization yesterday.

Senator Beveridge has always stood close to the Roosevelt administration, while Fairbanks has never been identified with it. The new situation puts enormous power into the hands of Beveridge and gives him the opportunity to build up a machine much greater and more effective than that constructed by the vice-president.

Thomas Taggart, former national chairman of the Democratic party, is jubilant over the results in the state. He declared today that the legislature would be Democratic by a big majority.

LANDSLIDE DELAYS WORK

Steam Shovel Buried and Dumpcars Ditched. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Bay City, Or., Nov. 4.—Construction work on the P. R. & N. railroad near Bay City has been delayed a few days on account of a heavy landslide, which buried the steam shovel and precipitated five of the dump cars over the embankment into the bay. A crew has been working night and day clearing away the dirt.
