

THESE STATES SAVED FOR BRYAN

Maryland Given Back to the Solid South—Colorado Is Undoubtedly Democratic—West Virginia in Doubt—State Tickets.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chicago, Nov. 4.—The Republicans, after a stubborn contest and holding out to the last, have conceded Maryland back to the solid south and to Bryan and the Democratic state ticket.

West Virginia has not yet decided where it stands, but the chances favor Taft and the Republican state ticket.

Colorado Republicans refuse to admit they are defeated, but the state is undoubtedly Democratic.

The Democrats gained two governors in important Republican states and elected two others in states where the electoral vote was given to Taft.

Indiana and Ohio are Democratic from the state standpoint, while going to the Taft column.

Governor Johnson of Minnesota and Governor Norris of Montana managed to save themselves and the Democratic state ticket.

Although the leaders of the Republican party are claiming that Colorado has given the Republican national and state tickets a plurality, there is absolutely no definite information upon which to base such claims.

The Wheeling Register claims the election of Bennett Democrat, for governor of West Virginia by 12,000, while the intelligence claims Glasscock Republican, is successful by at least 10,000. The figures indicate a small Bryan plurality.

The victory of Governor Hughes by 40,000 over Lieutenant-Governor Lewis Stuyvesant Chanler is one of the big surprises of the election. He developed unexpected strength up-state overcoming the plurality given Chanler in the city.

Governor Warner of Michigan has probably been defeated by L. T. Hemen, Democrat, though the state is safely Republican.

The chances favor the election of the Democrats in the hot contests in Indiana, Nebraska and Minnesota.

Governor John A. Johnson has been re-elected in Minnesota but by a reduced plurality.

Marshall, Democrat, has carried Indiana under remarkable circumstances, as the state went for Taft and all other Democrats on the state ticket were beat.

en. Shallenberger is probably winner of Nebraska, though it is still in doubt. Governor Davidson, Republican, has carried Wisconsin, according to the returns today.

WASHINGTON

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Nov. 4.—The state of Washington joined in the landslide of Taft yesterday. The heavy vote and the slow count make it impossible to determine accurately the extent of the Republican victory, but this much is certain: That Washington gives Taft a plurality of at least 48,000, exceeding by 15,000 the preliminary estimate of State Chairman De Bruler.

The entire Republican state ticket is elected by majorities that run well up with the presidential ticket.

That the legislature is overwhelmingly Republican, although Democrats got in from Stevens county and possibly a Democratic senator from Mason, Kitsap, and Island.

That there is no doubt whatever that Wesley L. Jones will be elected to succeed Ankeny.

That this county's plurality for Taft is to be estimated on the basis of the returns now in at 14,000; Spokane between 5,000 and 6,000 and the remainder of the counties all in proportion to the Taft vote.

County tickets are generally Republican. Here and there a few Democratic officials have got in in some of the eastern Washington counties, but they are exceptions.

It is estimated that at least 186,000 votes were cast in the state. The Democrats made their chief showing on Bryan.

The Socialists cast approximately 12,000 votes, as nearly as can be determined, with 40 per cent of the votes only about 10 per cent of the voters cast.

The Prohibitionists made their usual showing and cast probably 3,500 votes.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Spokane, Wash., Nov. 4.—Returns today indicate that the Republicans have carried everything except possibly two members of the legislature. Judge Pondexter for congress leads Goodyear by at least 4,000. The Republicans now claim the city and county by 8,000. The state ticket falls but little below the Taft vote.

Olympia, Wash., Nov. 4.—Complete returns from 21 out of 26 precincts in Thurston county give Taft 1,451; Bryan 715; Cosgrove, 1,490; Pattison, 743. Other state officers average the same vote. Large pluralities are given to every Republican county candidate.

CALIFORNIA

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Returns indicate Taft's lead in the state over Bryan will be 100,000.

While Frank J. Murasky, Democrat, led his Republican opponent, Henry A. Melvin, in San Francisco in the race for the supreme court justiceship, he was unable to meet the vote Melvin brought in from the state.

With few exceptions the so-called machine Republicans beat the independent wing of the party by approximately 53 assemblymen to 21. The figures received this morning indicate the 74 Republicans and six Democrats will be returned to the assembly.

The state senate is a clean sweep for the Republicans, the regulars securing 17 in the upper house of the legislature and the independents three. Hayes, Republican, for congress, and Kahn, Republican, have a hard fight. Both may lose.

For judges of the superior courts in the counties outside of San Francisco, the Republicans had few exceptions were the victors.

Returns from 24 precincts in which the vote has been verified this morning and returns from 60 other precincts which have been counted, indicate that Judge Frank H. Dunne will defeat Carroll Cook for judge of the superior court. There are four judges to be

selected for the long term and one for the short term. George H. Cabaniss, Democrat, has been elected for the short-term over Isadora Golden, Republican.

For the long term Judges John Hunt and George A. Sturtevant seem to have a lead that assures them places at the head of the ticket. Judge Dunne, Democrat, and Judge Van Nostrand, Republican, are fighting for the leading place on the ticket.

San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Two hundred and seventy-five precincts out of 300 in San Francisco give Judge Frank H. Dunne, Democrat, and good government judge nominees for superior judge, a substantial plurality. Returns from these precincts indicate that Judge Carroll Cook, Republican, has been defeated by a big vote. Cook was opposed by Francis J. Henry and other leaders of the graft prosecution.

San Luis Obispo, Cal., Nov. 4.—Thirteen precincts out of Taft 350, Bryan 207. For congress, Smith, Republican, 296; Sheppard, Democrat, 173.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 4.—Complete unofficial returns from Los Angeles city and county give Taft 179, Bryan 14,514. For congress, Seventh district, J. McLachlan, Republican, 23,651; J. R. Rush, Democrat, 15,885.

San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Returns from all over the state indicate that Taft will have a plurality of 75,000 in California. Reports from the mountain counties coming in slowly out down the immense lead of the Republican cause date but it seems certain he will have at least 75,000.

We will have a plurality of 75,000 easily," said General Stone, state Republican campaign manager, this afternoon. "This election shows that California is safely Republican and cannot be won over to the Democrats."

Secretary Murray of the Democratic state committee said this afternoon: "It is hard to understand how Taft could carry the state. Counties that should have given us majorities went the other way. It was evidently a Republican landslide."

San Francisco, Nov. 4.—Returns from all portions of the state this afternoon indicate that Harry A. Melvin, Republican, has been elected justice of the supreme court over Frank J. Murasky, Democrat, by a majority of 20,000. Melvin ran behind his ticket because of the vote given to Judge Murasky in San Francisco.

INDIANA

(United Press Leased Wire.) Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 4.—John Worth Kern, defeated candidate for the vice-presidency, will probably be elected United States senate as the successor of Senator Hemenway, according to the returns today.

Though Taft carried the state by over 5,000 to 10,000, the incomplete returns indicate that Marshall, Democrat, for governor, has a majority of over 20,000 to 30,000 and it seems assured that the legislature will be Democratic.

The movement for the election of Kern to the senate has already been started by the Democratic leader and an astounding reversal of results by later returns, it seems, can prevent the election of Bryan's running mate.

The representative of the seventh district, chairman of the house committee on mails, has probably been defeated, though the returns are incomplete and the result may be changed. The entire Republican state ticket, with the exception of governor, was elected.

MISSOURI

(United Press Leased Wire.) St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 4.—Returns at 2 a. m. today indicate that the states in the lower Mississippi valley have clung to their political traditions. While returns are meager, Missouri has returned to the Democratic column with an estimated plurality of more than 30,000 for Bryan. Cowherd, Democrat, has apparently defeated Hadley.

The congressional fights are in doubt. The hottest fights are in the Fifth, Eleventh and Twelfth districts. The Democrats here reported definitely. In the Twelfth Selph, Democrat, apparently has captured a Republican district, although later returns may change the result. Selph will be Democratic unless a landslide changes the outlook. Stone seems at this hour to lead in the gubernatorial nomination for senator. Kern is the Republican leader.

ILLINOIS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Springfield, Ill., Nov. 4.—Today's returns show that Taft's plurality in Illinois will possibly reach 200,000. He is seen, Republican, for governor, will receive a plurality of approximately 75,000.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chicago, Nov. 4.—Eugene W. Chafin, Prohibition presidential candidate, epitomized the results of the election from the Prohibition view: "The Democratic party can never win another national victory. Let it die."

"From now until the close of the national campaign of 1912 there will be but two parties: the Prohibition party and the whiskey party."

"The whiskey Democrats of the north have sold out the Democrats of the south on the national ticket for local offices."

"The liquor traffic, fearing absolute annihilation by the temperance wave now sweeping over the country has gone bodily over to the Republican party with the promise of immunity from death by local option."

"Taft is the best representative of the traffic that has ever been elected president."

OHIO

(United Press Leased Wire.) Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 4.—Democratic returns concede Taft a plurality of 50,000, but claim Harmon, Democratic nominee for governor, has been elected by an overwhelming plurality. Returns from the farming section are slow. Harris, Republican nominee for governor, was slaughtered in the cities by the liberal element. The Democrats believe the returns from the rural districts will offset this, and the result is still in doubt.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 4.—Returns carried Hamilton county by 12,000. For governor, Harmon, Democrat, carried the county by 16,000. For congress, Republican, for congressman, by 5,000.

Toledo, Ohio, Nov. 4.—Official returns today show Bryan leading Lucas county. Taft, however, will probably receive a plurality of 2,000.

UTAH

(United Press Leased Wire.) Salt Lake, Utah, Nov. 4.—Returns today show Utah overwhelmingly Republican. The Republican ticket swept Salt Lake county with pluralities ranging from 5,000 to 8,000. The Mormons, organized against the anti-Mormon, or American party and showed it under. Not an official was elected on the anti-Mormon ticket.

NORTH DAKOTA

(United Press Leased Wire.) Fargo, N. D., Nov. 4.—Scattering returns from all parts of the state indicate that Taft will carry North Dakota by about 20,000. For governor Burke, Democrat, it runs 17,000 and his figures

COLORADO

(United Press Leased Wire.) Denver, Colo., Nov. 4.—This morning less than a third of the ballots cast in Colorado had been counted. These are unimportant precincts and the chairman of the state committees of both parties are claiming the state by figures varying from 8,000 to 12,000.

In the state 472 precincts out of 1,122 give Taft 29,133 and Bryan 22,298. The scratched ballots number 65,707.

Returns from 14 Denver precincts indicate a Democratic victory in the city, with the exception of Johnson (Republican), for governor range from 7,000 to 2,000. Marshall leads in the Republican primary for nomination for the United States senatorship, and his election is conceded.

KANSAS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Topeka, Kan., Nov. 4.—Returns indicate that the Republicans have lost the state legislature. The Republican chairman has conceded that the result is in doubt. This means the defeat of Bristow for the United States senate. All congressmen from the state are Republican. Taft's plurality will probably be 25,000.

WISCONSIN

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 4.—Practically complete returns from all over the state give Taft a plurality of 87,982. The entire Republican state ticket is elected by 80,000. Ten Republicans and Welles, Democrat, were elected to congress. The Socialists lost two strong fights for congress.

IDAHO

(United Press Leased Wire.) Boise, Idaho, Nov. 4.—The plurality of Taft in Idaho will probably reach 18,000. James H. Brady, Republican, is elected governor over M. Alexander, Democrat, by 3,000 to 5,000. The legislature will be Republican on joint ballot.

ARKANSAS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 4.—The early morning returns indicate a plurality of 10,000 for Bryan. A small vote is assigned the cause for reduced Democratic figures.

NEBRASKA

(United Press Leased Wire.) Omaha, Neb., Nov. 4.—Later returns today from the farming districts with incomplete results show Nebraska still doubtful, though Bryan is maintaining a strong lead. The Commoner has gained heavily in the city and larger towns, but the country districts will decide the result. Sheldon, Republican, for governor, probably has been beaten by Shallenberger, Democrat.

TEXAS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Dallas, Texas, Nov. 4.—Despite the hope of the Republicans for a split on prohibition in the Democratic primary in the Tenth and Fifteenth congressional districts, both districts went Democratic. Complete state returns will probably be delayed several days.

OKLAHOMA

(United Press Leased Wire.) Guthrie, Okla., Nov. 4.—The Democratic lead in Oklahoma was reduced by today's returns. Heavy Socialist vote polled in the southern counties, which were supposed to be strongly Democratic, has helped Bryan's plurality. Bryan will receive from 15,000 to 20,000 in the state.

LOUISIANA

(United Press Leased Wire.) New Orleans, La., Nov. 4.—Incomplete returns indicate a plurality of 35,000 for Bryan in Louisiana.

NEW MEXICO

(United Press Leased Wire.) Santa Fe, N.M., Nov. 4.—The territorial Democratic primary election today concedes the reelection of Congressional Delegate Andrews. The legislature will probably be Republican.

MINNESOTA

(United Press Leased Wire.) St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 4.—Taft's plurality has approximated from today's returns will reach 100,000. This is 71,000 less than Roosevelt polled four years ago.
