PAIR OF HOODOOS BURN TOGETHER

Jake Luppold's Auto and a Bale of 1907 Hops Cremated at Santa Rosa.

Santa Rosa, Cal., Nov. 4.—A pile of ashes and twisted iron today marks the remains of the "hoodoo" automobile destroyed last night by Jake Luppold in celebrating the election of Taft. The evil spirits which Luppold professed to believe haunted the machine were put to rest in sight today and the owner firmly believes they have forever fled from his life. In honor of the occasion he gave a banquet last night to a number of friends.

Another "hoodoo" is believed to have been removed, as in the pyre of the auto there was placed a bale of 1907 hops, a part of the famous "hoodoo" crop of that year.

When Luppold some weeks ago announced his intention to burn the auto he was flooded with letters from all

FISH HORN DEALERS ARRESTED BY POLICE

Fish horns sold like hot cakes on Washington street, last night, until the policemen rounded up four young men who were charged with peddling without licenses.

Ross Nicholas was the chief promoter of the fish horn syndicate, apparently, though when cornered he said he was selling them for a toy store. Frank Bula, A. Pingold and George Mitchell were also arrested.

As a result of the raid on the horn peddlers the interior of the police station looked like a football special bound from Eugene to Portland on Thanksgiving morning. There were fish horns everywhere, fish horns of tin and fish horns of paper, with and without wooden mouthpieces and of all colors. Several large baskets were needed to hold the collection.

The hearing of the vendors in the police court was postponed until tomorrow.

FIRE IN HEART OF NEW FRISCO

Evidences of Incendiarism in Building Owned by John Levi.

San Francisco, Nov. 4.—A fire believed to have been of incendiary origin gutted an eight-story steel and concrete building, owned by John Levi, at Minna and New Montgomery streets, at 1:30 o'clock this morning, destroying the stock of wholesale firms and causing a total loss of \$500,000.

The fire threatened the tall buildings of the reconstructed downtown district for a time and it was only after the hardest work that it was confined to the one building.

A night watchman found rags soaked with coal oil on the highest three floors of the building. Levi used the top floor as a store room for furniture. He purchased the building 10 months ago from Mrs. Dresler, widow of the sugar king.

TARIFF REVISED BY ITS FRIENDS

Uncle Joe's Chances to Be Made Boss Reviser Seem Good.

New York, Nov. 4.—The tariff will be revised by its friends. The next congress will have a Republican plurality of 69. If "Uncle Joe" can withstand the opposition within his own party he will preside over a legislative assembly composed of 230 Republicans and 161 Democrats. The Republicans not only gained 8 or 9 new seats but carried back into the fold four which they lost two years ago. Every organization and about the only well-known face that will be missing on the majority side of the house will be that of James Schomcraft Sherman. Seneca E. Payne, chairman of the ways and means committee, is expected and will have the privilege of introducing the new tariff bill at the special session, which the Republicans say, is to be called immediately after the inauguration.

GLAD TO BE BACK IN JAIL AGAIN

If Denny Hazel Must Be Hanged, He'll Take His Legally, Please.

Yreka, Cal., Nov. 4.—After an exciting night ride to escape a crowd of Portuguese laborers bent on lynching him, Denny Hazel, convicted of the murder of Joseph Silva, a Portuguese farmer, today reached the jail here from which he escaped last Monday.

Hazel wandered through the country and was forced by hunger to beg for food at the home of J. L. Crenshaw last night. Crenshaw gave him something to eat, and then notified the sheriff at Yreka. The news of Hazel's capture reached the Portuguese laborers and a lynching party was formed.

Hazel begged Crenshaw to take him to the jail, and Crenshaw, heavily armed, set out. He was met by deputy sheriff, and after a fast ride Hazel was safely landed in jail.
