Day after day reports of petty robberies are received by the police, and although extra precautions have been taken in chasing suspected undesirable out of the city the minor burglaries continue. ALIBREYED HUNTLEY'S LAW

Election Quietest Ever Held in Oregon Is Verdict of Veterans.

All things in favor of the Huntley corrupt practice act this morning say "aye." Weak chorus of ayes from the long-enders, holding more or less empty pocketbooks. Loud chortles and guffaws from those individuals with newly-swollen fortunes belonging to the "I Told You So" lodge. Thus it is today over the state, nobody is ever going to bet on anything again, ever—except the men who won.

Also, and incidentally, there are in Portland today many men who are grateful to "Doc" Anderson and his straw ballot, which drove some \$15,000 of Taft money to cover with its apparent \$ to 1 Bryan landslide, thus keeping scores of betting men from a tempting bait of 15,000 majority coin. It might be interjected, however, as a side remark that the two men who pulled down the famed majority money are just a trifle grouchy today.

Yesterday did not look like an old-time election. It appeared, from the veterans' standpoint, like either a Sunday school picnic or a funeral. Gone were the brass bands, the candidates adorned with cards of candidates and sample ballots. Gone were the automobiles plastered with candidates' pictures, scurrying to get the reluctant voter. Gone was the button and the badge. Gone was everything except the booth, the judges, the voter and the ballot.

The Huntley law showed itself yesterday to be a great changer of outward appearances. The polling places appeared deserted. Now and then a man drifted into the booths, hurried to a moment and departed leaving behind him, for the most part, one more boost for Taft. That is all there was to it.

As a matter of fact no Oregon election was ever so quiet, so devoid of excitement as this year's. There was no trouble of any kind, no alterations at the polls, no arguments or disturbances, no cash and ballot lots, asked how the vote was running, whether they were heavy or light, and went their way.

The usual 11th hour bets were absent. The Huntley law cast its shadow over betting. The sunshine brought out a heavy vote. The absence of interference of any kind at the polls allowed the ballots to be handed rapidly and the count was made quickly, the first returns being received before 10 o'clock.

Plating With Cadmium.

The difficulties of electroplating with cadmium have been recently overcome, thus opening up an important use for the metal, which is now obtainable at a moderate price. The best results have been obtained from specially prepared cadmium carbonate, carefully purified, although the commercial salt has proven fairly satisfactory. The cadmium carbonate is dissolved in a solution of potassium cyanide, forming a clear, bright yellow plating bath, and calcium plate is used for the anode. A perfect deposit is had with either a hot or cold bath, a temperature of about 135 degrees Fahrenheit being preferred. The coating, though soft, is harder than silver, and the color is as white as tin, but not so white as silver. The surface, which takes a very high polish, is not readily tarnished by sulphureted hydrogen or other vapors.
