VAULT LOOTED OF STAMPED ENVELOPES

the postmaster denied. The question of salary was also discussed at length. Bailman said, "I was endeavoring to bring out that while others in the local office had received an increase in salary the postmaster had written to Washington recommending that no increase in Straus allowance be made. Mr. Minto also denied this statement."

The most startling evidence brought out this morning, beyond the details of the satchels taking the place of stamped envelopes, by Miss Bollman was a statement that on June 30 she had been ordered to make certain changes in her bookkeeping accounts at the direction of Mr. Minto. This was for the sum of \$313, representing stamps supposed to have been sold.

To Hide Shortage.
"Mr. Minto had me change the debit of \$313 from red to black ink," Miss Bollman said. "I said that he didn't want the inspectors to know anything about the shortage."

Miss Bollman explained that she had put the figures in red because of the discrepancy and to keep them separate from the other entries.

This was brought out by counsel for the defense. Later, upon cross-examination by Walter H. Evans, assistant district attorney, Miss Bollman said that the entry had been made to make the cash receipts balance with the stock of accounts. Her first discoveries were that between \$1,300 and \$1,400 was missing. Several letter carriers' satchels, the witness testified, were found in boxes which were supposed to have contained stamped envelopes worth about \$312. She didn't know how long

the satchels had been in the vaults in stamped envelope boxes. The first Miss Bollman knew of the shortage was April 30. Mr. Straus left the department, having requested leave of absence April 27.

Miss Hollman was closely questioned by counsel for the defendant to show that others beside Mr. Straus knew the combination of the safe in which the postoffice cash is kept. Mr. Minto had since August, 1906. It had been given her, she said, by Mr. Straus. She stated further that she had never seen Mr. Minto or Mr. Shipley enter the safe in the cashier's office. Later it was brought out that the postmaster, as custodian of the building, had the combination of all the other safes in the federal building.

Questions relative to those who had keys to the stockroom where between \$50,000 and \$200,000 worth of goods are kept, were also asked, the object of the defense being to show that several of the janitors had entrance to this department which is in the basement.

The defense is endeavoring to show that others beside Mr. Straus had access to the vaults and safes and stockroom. The hearing is going on this afternoon.
