

# ON GIVES CLUE TO EDNA CLARK

## She Bought Ticket to Boston Over the Santa Fe, Agent Rigdon Says.

(United Press Special Wire.)  
Alameda, Cal., Nov. 6.—Broken-hearted by the mysterious disappearance and absence of her daughter, Edna Clark, the art student for whom the police of many cities are seeking, Mrs. A. E. Mack is at her home, hysterical, in a state of mental and physical collapse.

The only cheering news is that her daughter on the day of her disappearance purchased a ticket to Boston at the Oakland ticket office of the Santa Fe railroad. The family faintly hope that a letter from the girl will soon arrive.

The identity of Miss Clark with the girl who bought a ticket for Boston on October 27 was established by Ticket Agent T. A. Rigdon of the Santa Fe and by the family.

Rigdon said the photograph of Miss Clark as that of the purchaser of the ticket. He particularly described a pin in the girl's hair, which was a point of investigation point, and one stone, the lowest in the pin, was missing, the agent said.

Relatives declare that Edna Clark owned and wore such a pin. They say it was lost from the girl several weeks ago and that it was paired then by the girl's grandfather, Elijah Clark, who is a retired jeweler. The stone was shaped like an inverted dark blue than the others. A few feet away the pin still had the appearance of having a stone missing.

Rigdon says the girl told him she wished a ticket cancelled that she had purchased in San Francisco. She appeared greatly agitated and hesitated about buying the Boston ticket. The ticket had stop-over privileges for the Grand Canyon and Chicago.

The family believes the girl went to Boston, as she had often expressed the desire to study at the Boston Academy of Art.

# FIFTEEN YEARS IN JAIL FOR MORSE

(Continued from Page One.)

The men were found guilty yesterday of misappropriation of the funds of the bank and falsification of the records.

The court sentenced the men early at the Tombs prison this morning and breakfasted heartily at 6 o'clock. They were taken to the Tombs prison at 8 o'clock. Mrs. Morse greeted her husband calmly. Neither showed much emotion.

The meeting of Curtis and his wife was a complete nervous wreck. The disgraced banker almost wept as he sprang to his feet and opened his arms.

Judge Hough, in his sentence, declared that Curtis was under the influence of a stronger mind, and said Curtis efforts to reform conditions were blocked by the bank's supreme board of directors.

The room was crowded when Judge Hough took his place on the bench. Morse and Curtis sat, with two deputy sheriffs in front of them. Both were greatly agitated.

Mrs. Curtis, scarcely able to control herself, sat with her sister, Mrs. George, and Colonel E. M. Thompson.

Mrs. Morse was seated with her husband's sons, Harry and Ben.

Morse did not flinch when his sentence was passed. His face showed but a little expression, and he did not move. There was not the slightest trace of emotion.

With his wife, sons and counsel, Morse conversed in the marshal's office until noon, when he was returned to the Tombs.

Morse was sentenced to serve the 15 years in the federal prison at Atlanta.

Curtis was cheered by hundreds of persons as he left the postoffice building, where the courtroom is located. His wife recovered any of the emotion he loudly cheered. They hurried to their home.

Judge Hough's High Finance.

In passing the minimum sentence on Curtis and suspending it, Judge Hough said:

"The recommendation of a particularly painstaking and intelligent jury

and the district attorney, incline the court toward clemency. The court does not believe it was the intention of the defendant, Curtis, to engage in illegal transactions.

"In the opinion of the jury and court, embarked upon a wrong course, and when he found himself involved he did not have the strength to stop. With the jurors, I believe that he writhed under the domination of a stronger mind."

"He was conscious of the wrong but with the prospect of losing a position paying better than any he ever held before or was likely ever to hold again, his feeble efforts at reform met with little assistance from the supreme board of directors, and he went on hoping that all would come out right in the end. All this has been fairly shown by the evidence."

"His personal honesty has never been assailed, and I believe in it. I am advised outside the record that he has undergone financial ruin besides the disgrace of his conviction. In the case of the defendant, Curtis, the sentence is suspended."

"In the case of the defendant, Morse, nothing need be said or added to the evidence. As nearly always in cases of illegality in finance, he used the bank for a large general scheme and the depositors' money for his own speculative purposes. If such schemes shall not entail severe punishment, they are allowed to be carried out with impunity, the public will be at the mercy of bank adventurers."

"The sentence of this court is that the defendant, Morse, shall be placed for 15 years in the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga."

Rigdon was granted 10 days for the filing of an application for a writ of error and remanded Morse to the Tombs. The career of Charles Wyman Morse is summarized as follows:

Son of Benjamin W. Morse.  
Was graduated from Bowdoin college in 1874.  
Traveled in Europe several months.  
Married Hattie Bishop Hussey, April 18, 1884. She died July 26, 1897.  
Married second time to Mrs. Clarence Cowles Dodge, June 18, 1901.  
Engaged with his father in the shipping business at Bath, Me. in 1877.  
Removed to Brooklyn in 1880 and engaged in the ice business, extensively, in Philadelphia and Baltimore.  
He gradually became largely interested in steamship transportation and various financial institutions.  
In the summer of 1897 he reached the height of his career, controlling the Metropolitan Steamship company, the Ward line, the Clyde Steamship company, the Eastern Steamship company, the Hudson Navigation company, the Boston Insurance company, the Title Insurance company, the New York, New York and London Steamship company, the Fifth Avenue estates, the Century Realty company and the William Campbell Waller real estate business at Bath, Me. president of the Wall Street Exchange Building association.  
He belonged to the Metropolitan, Union league and University clubs. He owned a magnificent residence at 724 Fifth avenue and maintained his chief offices at 41 Wall street.  
New York, Nov. 6.—Counsel for Morse filed a writ of habeas corpus for Morse from Judge LeComb in the United States circuit court. This acts as a temporary stay until application for bail can be made.

# THIRD TRIAL OF ARE RUEF OPENS

(United Press Special Wire.)  
San Francisco, Nov. 6.—Francis J. Heney, assistant federal district attorney and graft prosecutor, in opening today the third trial of Abraham Ruef, indicted ex-hoss of San Francisco, in his address to the jury detailed at length what he would attempt to prove in the development of his case.

Ruef is being tried on the charge of having offered a bribe of \$4,000 to Supervisor John Furey for the passage of the overhead trolley franchise ordinance shortly after the fire of 1906.

Although the charge necessarily involves but one of the hooding board of supervisors, all the other members of the board will be called upon to testify. The courts have held that the testimony of the other members is pertinent if it tends to show a plot and also to prove felonious intent in the alleged offering of the bribe money to Furey.

Heney detailed the circumstances of the passing of the trolley ordinance and declared he would prove that three—Ford and Patrick Calhoun of the United Railroads, offered the money to Ruef and that Ruef offered the money to Furey through Supervisor Gallagher.

**WEATHER REPORT**  
A small disturbance in central over Alberta, and the storm which yesterday was north of Montana is now central over the Canadian province of Ontario. High pressure area controlling the weather in the Pacific states has remained nearly stationary, while the high pressure area over the Northwest has moved southward to the Gulf states. Light to moderately heavy rain has fallen in central and western Washington, and snow has occurred at scattered places in New England and the middle Atlantic states. Elsewhere throughout the United States fair weather prevails. It is much warmer in the lower Missouri and upper Mississippi valleys than in the lake region. The temperatures on the Pacific slope are about normal, but in the Atlantic and Gulf states it is cooler than usual.
