

# CALLS KAISER TO GET OFF THRONE

Editor of Influential German Journal Extends This as the Alternative of Imperial Blundering That Enrages Germany.

 Berlin, Nov. 6.—As the culmination of weeks of protest against the diplomatic errors of the German foreign office, Editor Hardin, of "Die Zukunft," today came out with the bold declaration that the kaiser must either curb his tendency to engage in controversial politics or abdicate the throne. The utterance is considered the boldest that has ever appeared in a German newspaper. It has created great excitement here and there is talk that Hardin will be called to task for his editorial.

The attack of Editor Hardin is being widely quoted all over the empire. Hardin said, in part:

"Does the emperor desire to renounce the throne? His grandfather contemplated abdication in a less serious crisis than this and one that was not brought about by his own faults.

"The emperor must not be blind to the fact that his fellow-countrymen are against both him and his chancellor. Neither Chancellor Von Buelow nor his successor can retain office without a pledge from the emperor that will limit his share in the government.

"The future of Germany must demand that the house of Hohenzollern must demand it too in this crucial hour; otherwise it will be too late."

London, Nov. 6.—According to the highest authority the author of the famous interview in which Emperor William declared that his plan of campaign, offered voluntarily to England, was later adopted in crushing the Boers, is Sir Rowland Hillenbrandt, an Irish baronet. Sir Rowland married a German baroness and is an intimate friend of the kaiser.

Berlin, Nov. 6.—Germans are demanding the complete reorganization of the foreign office. The press is insistent that the affairs of the office be left to a minister who shall have complete charge without interference from the kaiser, who is characterized as impetuous.

Beginning with a loss of prestige to Germany through the failure of the German foreign office to foresee the success of the Young Turk movement and culminating in the Casa Blanca fiasco and the London Express incident, Germany has had the worst of every international complication.

The so-called triple alliance among England, France and Russia is condemned by the Germans as a foolish blunder on the part of German diplomats because Germany was left out of the international entente.

Recognizing the impetuosity of the emperor, there is greater need of diplomacy in the foreign office than in any other of the chancelleries, say the Germans.

The German people love peace, and they argue that it is better to clean house now than to let the blundering continue to a point where Germany will be compelled either to fight or to withdraw from a new engagement with another loss of national prestige.

The German foreign office is criticized because of its failure to agree with France on some points of action in the Casa Blanca case before it became necessary to demand or send apologies to protect national prestige and honor.

# URGE CITY TO BUY ON MT. TABOR

East Side Citizens Appear Before Park Board to Advance Arguments in Favor of Land Purchase Recommended by Olmsteads.

Representatives of every district on the east side appeared before the park board this morning and strongly recommended that that body urge the council to secure 184 acres on Mount Tabor as one of the new park sites which the city is to acquire. After listening to the arguments put forth by several of the visitors, the park board assured them that great weight would be attached to their unanimity of opinion when the matter is taken up jointly with the council next Wednesday.

H. H. Newhall, chairman of the special committee appointed by the Federated East Side clubs to present the views of that organization to the park board declared that it is the disinterested desire of a great majority of the people on the east side of the Willamette that Mount Tabor be selected as the place for the largest of the new parks. He said that nowhere in the city could a more beautiful location be secured. He thought that besides the original tract of 184 acres recommended by Olmstead Bros. as a park site, the city should also include another tract of 10 or more acres facing on West avenue. This could be used as an approach to the top of the hill and would be within easy reach of many streetcar lines.

Members of the special committee advanced many good reasons why Mount Tabor should be selected as the principal park location on the east side. In their opinion the park board would be able to buy the land for from \$1,500 to \$2,000 an acre. Many property owners, it was said, are willing to sell for those figures and those who are not may be forced to sell by condemnation proceedings.

F. Swenson called the attention of the board to a 12-acre park site on the right bank of the Willamette river at the foot of Skidmore street. He said this tract would make an ideal park and would be a blessing to the thickly settled Albina district. He thought the land could be acquired for \$42,000.

The board appointed Mr. Lewis as a committee of one to meet with the city council to make arrangements as to the method of procedure to be adopted in providing parks for the people.

# THIRTEEN CHINESE GAMBLERS FINED

# NEW PRESIDENT FOR PERUVIANS

Parden Is Chased Out of Power and Ferdinand Leguia Now Rules.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
 San Francisco, Nov. 6.—News of a revolution in Peru that forced the retirement of former President Parden and the elevation of Ferdinand Leguia was brought here today by G. M. Sawyer, an American engineer who arrived on the German steamer Amazon.

Sawyer was in the South American republic during the troublesome times and witnessed the uprisings, which were led by the famous outlaw, Duran. Duran led his forces into Lima, October 4, and burned several municipal buildings. He only announced his purpose to assassinate President Parden and was driven from the city only after a hard fight.

The revolutionists were driven to the mountains, where they burned railroad bridges and tore up track. Later the leaders of the movement were captured and executed. The popular indignation against Parden later caused the president to retire and Leguia was selected in his stead.
