WASHINGTON AND PULLMAN IN TIE

Both Elevens Score Field Goal and Safety After Hard Play.

University of Washington, Nov. 7.—For 79 minutes this afternoon the University of Washington and the Washington State College of Pullman, battled for victory and the state football championship and left the field without having scored a point. The game, which was one of the greatest exhibitions ever seen in the northwest, ended a tie six to six, each team making a place-kick and a safety. The contest showed that Washington has a real football team this year and that Pullman's aggression is in no way inferior to the W. S. C. eleven of last season. It was one of those games that keep the rosters on the anxious seat every second when scoring seemed imminent. Both bands of warriors fought hard and viciously, smashed and crashed fearlessly and used every ounce of strength they possessed to win the coveted victory. Both teams played well in all departments and the game comforted the requirements of an ideal football contest in every particular.

Washington Better in First. Throughout the first half Washington had much the better of its opponents, keeping the ball in Pullman's territory and threatening the goal repeatedly by means of place-kicks. Six times in the game Washington essayed to put the ball between the goal posts by a place or drop kick and succeeded only once. Pullman tried for goals from field three times and got one over safely.

During the first half Pullman was kept busy defending its own goal and had little time or opportunity to play on the offensive. The result was a tie, the smallest weighing 170, formed a veritable stone wall at critical times which the Washington backfield was utterly unable to pierce. In midfield however, and when there was no danger of a touchdown the variety found holes and gained materially. In the first half Washington advanced the ball 207 yards on line bucks while Pullman made only 70 yards.

Until 10 minutes before the close of the game Washington was clearly superior to W. S. C. but Pullman finished strong and was outplaying the U. of W. when the whistle blew. The beef of the visitors told as the game advanced and it was plain that Washington was weakening under the grueling punning of the heavy Pullman backs.

After making a safety and tying the score Pullman played harder and better than at any other time during the struggle. In the last 10 minutes of play Pullman advanced the ball 52 yards on line smashes out of a total of 123 yards made during the game.

For Washington Coyle was the star. Muckelstone and Eaken did great work and Westover and Taylor, new men, played well in the back field. For Pullman the brilliant star was Tackle Deener, the biggest man ever seen on the local field. Cave, Captain Wexler and Halm also played excellent games.

WASHINGTON AND STATE ARE TIED

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Nov. 7.—The game between the University of Washington and Washington State college ended in a tie, 6 to 6. Both teams made a place kick, but failed to cross the goal line. The

contest was bitterly fought, and was one of the greatest exhibitions of the college game ever seen in this city. During the first half Washington had the better of Pullman, but the latter's greater weight told as the game advanced and when the whistle blew Pullman was outplaying Washington. Washington tried for goal from the field six times and Pullman tried three times. Three times during the game the ball was brought within Pullman's 10-yard line, and once to the one-yard line, but the heavy Pullman line was impregnable at critical times. Washington's goal was never seriously threatened. On the whole, the score very well represents the comparative strength of the teams.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Minneapolis, Minn., Nov. 7.—Wisconsin bested Minnesota in a fiercely contested battle today by a score of 5 to 0. A forward pass following a little out-of-bounds football, dropped the ball back to Dean's hands and he crossed the Gopher goal line for the only marker of the game. Wisconsin failed to kick a goal. The game was hotly contested from start to finish. In the second half, although there were times when scoring seemed imminent, the teams rallied and held. Fumbling marred the beauty of the work of both teams but both played well in emergencies. The score came after the ball had been carried well down the field by a series of plays in which the Badgers plowed a way through the Gopher line. A forward pass to Dean gave the Badgers a 10 yard drop and secured the feature of the game, being quickly resorted to. The forward pass was also freely used.

Lafayette Easy for Quakers.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 7.—Although the Quakers expected a hard struggle with Lafayette, they were surprised when Pennsylvania won by a score of 24 to 4. It was the Quakers' last hard battle before the final games of the season with Michigan and Cornell, and the ease with which they disposed of the Lafayette eleven gave confidence to their followers.

STANFORD "U" TURNS TABLES ON BRITISH

(Heart News by Longest Leased Wire.) Stanford, Cal., Nov. 7.—Stanford's football team redeemed itself today in the second game with the team from Vancouver. The Cardinal players won by the same score—11 to 3—as Vancouver won on Wednesday, and in doing so played a hard game as their opponents and showed greater ability to score.

A peculiar feature of the game was that all the scoring was done in the last 10 minutes of play. The first half was about even with a slight advantage in favor of Vancouver. The second half, which was bitterly contested, went along without either side getting any points until 20 minutes of the 30-minute half had expired. With only 10 minutes to play, Stanford's writing and kicking for Kirmans and scored 11 in a half dozen plays. The Britishers rallied and made their 3 just before the whistle.
