CANNOT GET FEDERAL AID City Must Provide for Milk Inspection at Its Own Cost.

"We can't get government inspection of milk for Portland, as has been suggested by the city health board. The federal authorities make tests only in individual cases, when requested to do so. I have ascertained this by a visit to the United States pure food laboratory here."

This was Dr. Cottell's statement when asked what he thought of the plan to have the dairies tributary to the city brought under United States inspection.

The father of the pending pure milk ordinance is confident that the council will pass his measure in an amended form. He has enlisted the County Medical society, and a number of civic clubs in the fight, and these various organizations have appointed committees to assist him in presenting to the council an ordinance that that body will pass.

"The argument that dairies are sufficiently watched over by the state food and dairy commissioner is without weight," said the doctor. "Commissioner Bailey himself admits that he is not required to do so. His duty is to see that the milk contains the requisite amount of butter fat and not too much water. It may be filthy and full of disease germs and the state inspection will not reveal such condition."

GIVES DAMAGES TO MRS. STARK

Jury Orders Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Epler to Pay \$4,500 for Assault.

John H. Epler and his wife, proprietors of a rooming house on First street, will have to pay \$4,500 to Mrs. Mary A. Stark under a verdict returned in Judge Bronaugh's department of the circuit court last yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Stark is now in a hospital, suffering, it is alleged, from the effects of injuries inflicted by the Eplers more than one year ago, in ejecting her from their premises.

The case was hard fought from the time the taking of testimony began last Monday, occupying the time of Judge Bronaugh and 12 jurors all week. Dan J. Malarky and John E. Logan, for the plaintiff, with T. J. Cleaton on the other side, contested all the ground. An appeal by the defendants to the state supreme court is now expected.

Mrs. Stark and Mrs. Epler had a dispute about the rent of the room in which Mrs. Stark and her husband were living. Mrs. Stark was looking for other rooms and refused to pay in advance, even if she occupied the room. The Eplers then seized a bundle of her belongings with the intention of putting it into the hall, but Mrs. Stark caught one end of the bundle and a struggle followed. This resulted in Mrs. Stark and the Eplers differing from that point on. Mrs. Stark alleging that Mrs. Epler struck her twice in the face with her fist, that Mr. Epler hit her a glancing blow on the hand with a hammer, that she was thrown against the door casing and fell, and that Mrs. Epler then kicked her as she lay on the floor.

The Eplers denied that they had done anything more than the struggle with Mrs. Stark for possession of the bundle, and asserted that whatever injuries she may have sustained were due to this struggle. The jury in its verdict found for \$3,500 for the plaintiff as damages and \$1,000 for her medical expenses. To remove all doubt as to the \$1,000 being in addition to the other amount, Judge Bronaugh sent the jurors back to their room where they added a line to the verdict indicating that the full sum they desired Mrs. Stark to receive is \$4,500.
